Classes are scheduled to begin on Monday and students have until next Friday to register and add courses.

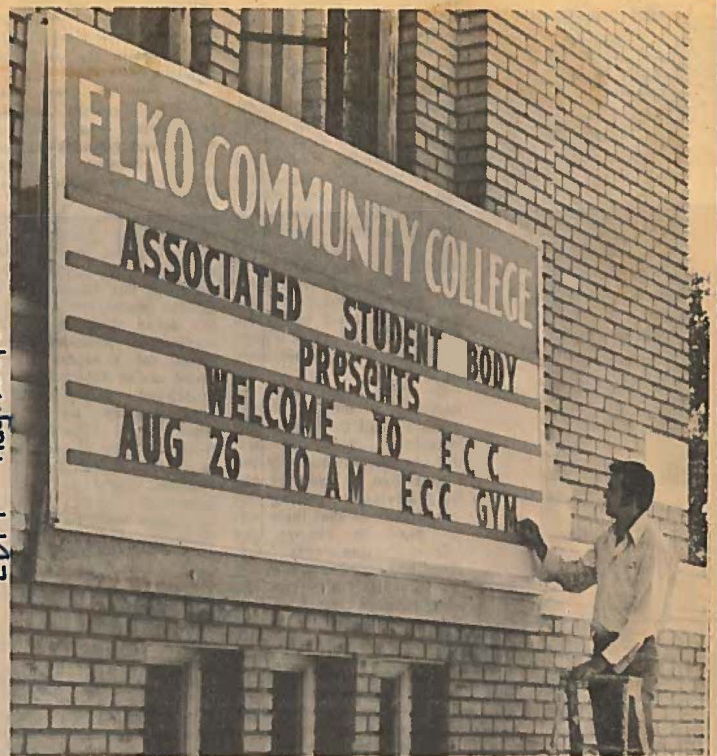
This year the college adopted the 4-1-4 course plan where the fall terms begins at the end of August with final examinations scheduled before Christmas week.

College Plans Orientation Program for Community

The Associated Student Body of Elko Community College in an orientation program to acquaint the community as well as incoming students with the workings of the college and to provide technical, academic, and vocational information for all students is sponsoring a "Welcome to Elko Community College" day on Thursday in the college gymnasium.

The program, which is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. and run until approximately 4:15 p.m., will feature several selected speakers from the business and professional community, the college faculty, and members of local clubs and organizations.

Discussions will include such areas as curriculum suggestions, employment security, available scholarships, and advantages and disadvantages of various careers.

The first speaker on the program will be Kent Mead

from the Nevada State Employment Agency. Other speakers, scheduled to give 15-minute presentations, will be Darwin Jensen, a district ranger for the U.S. Forest Service; Helen Wallace, also from the Forest Service who will discuss the field of personnel management; Frank Collett, another representative from the Forest Service who will discuss forest engineering; J. Kent Giles or Jerry Asher from the Bureau of Land Management; Allan Flock of the Nevada Fish and Game Department; and Detective Sgt. Robert L. Brush of the Elko Police Department who will explain the Law Enforcement Education Program at the college.

The afternoon program will begin at 12:45 with a presentation from Dr. John D. MacCarthy from the Elko Clinic and a member of the University of Nevada advisory board to the university's pre-med program. Also slated to

speakers are Mayor L.L. (Dutch) Stenovich; a representative from Vaughan, Hull, and Marfisi; Jerry Molof or Erving Hackett from the Soil Conservation Service; Fred C. Faupel, manager of Elko Chamber of Commerce, Phillip Cole, manager of Nevada National Bank; John Lundeen or Jerry Stevens from Elko General Hospital; Pepper Sturm from NYTC; and Sperry Rueckert, manager of Penney's.

At approximately 3:15 p.m. representatives from various civic, business, and professional organizations in Elko will discuss the purpose of their groups and what their organizations have to offer the community.

Bill Payne, vice president of the ASB and host for the program, invites all students and any interested persons to attend all or part of the day long session.

A free lunch will be served at noon in the gym.

College Registration Scheduled Tomorrow

Registration for classes offered during the Interim Period at Elko Community College will be held tomorrow from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the college.

The college is offering seven classes which will give the student an opportunity for uninterrupted and intensive study of one subject which particularly interests him.

Class instruction will begin Wednesday and the final exam period is scheduled for Jan. 19.

The courses offered are:
Office Machines (O. A.) 202-204, two credits: the two courses will be offered on the independent study basis with students having previous experience with business machines registering for O. A. 204.

Shakespeare, two credits: Further information concerning the class may be obtained by contacting Charles Greenhaw at the college.

Slide Rule, one credit: It is suggested that all students in science, math, and vocational-technical programs enroll in this class.

Computer Programming, one credit: A two day intensive study will be conducted by a University of Nevada professor from the computer center in Reno. The times and dates of this course will be announced later.

Readings in Oceanography, two credits: Intensive study of

the chemicals and physical properties of the world's oceans.

Techniques of Altering Behavior, one credit: Study of principles and practices in altering disturbing behavior patterns using the concept of logical consequences. This course is designed for persons working with youths, parents, corrections, education, etc.

Tour of Selected Nevada Ranches, one credit: This tour is designed to enlarge the knowledge of those people interested in ecology, utilization of our natural resources, and ranching in northern Nevada.

THAT THE ELKO Community College is rapidly assuming a much more significant place in Elko is apparent from the news columns this week in which news of new professors and also of the struggle for accreditation is reported.

There seems to be no doubt at this point that the college will become an established and successful institution and will be a real asset to this city.

Its possibilities for bringing advanced and special education to the residents of northeastern Nevada are unlimited and as the school grows, more and more steps will be taken to bring educational benefits to areas in which opportunities now are very limited.

An example of what the college has done and can do is contained in a letter addressed to Professor Charles Greenhaw of the local college and written by Sven Liljeblad, professor of Anthropology Emeritus at Idaho State University.

His letter was a report on the outcome of a course in Northern Paiute which he conducted for two weeks at the Duck Valley reservation at Owyhee at the request of the Shoshone-Paiute business council and under the auspices of the Elko Community College.

The course was only for two weeks but it attracted in excess of 40 individuals who expressed great interest in learning more about the Paiute language both as to speaking and writing.

In discussing benefits obtained from the course, Professor Liljeblad made this observation: "The course brought people together in a common effort, people who otherwise communicate only officially and sometimes with reservation. Thus, members of the tribal government, of the medical corps and of the teaching staff of the public school met with young and old individuals from the reservation on a basis which by tradition belongs to the people."

He suggests a full credit course be taught by the college at Owyhee not only in Paiute language and anthropology but also in Shoshone which is the other Indian language spoken at the reservation.

Furthering the education of the Indians in Nevada could be a goal of community colleges planned in the three principal areas of the state and a start on this phase of potential college work could be made as an example to the other colleges.

College To Offer Art Class

A three-credit art class, Intermediate Drawing and Life Study, is being offered this fall at Elko Community College.

Art 201 will be taught on Monday evenings from 7 to 9 by Sarah Campsey, who has a BS degree in art from West Texas State University.

Registration for the class is now being taken, according to the instructor, who said the first class will be held August 30. She said those unable to attend the first class should be sure to preregister.

Prerequisite for the class is Art 101-102 or approval of the instructor.

She noted supplies needed for the class include graphite pencils 2H, HB and 2B; charcoal; a sketch book 9" x 12" or larger; a newsprint pad 18" x 24", and the textbook, "Natural Way to Draw," by Nicolaiides.

A three-hour lab to be held with the class will be scheduled later.

College Child Center Enrollment Date Told

Elko Community College officials today released the enrollment schedule for the Child Development Center. Parents in the Elko area who have children between the ages of three and five are invited to make application to have their children enrolled in the Child Center.

Applications will be taken Wednesday, August 25 at the college from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Although construction of the center is not completed, parents are invited to visit and get acquainted with the program.

A college spokesman said one of the criteria for acceptance of a child into the program will be the availability of parents to

attend one evening session a week at the college. The evening session will consist of a parent discussion group which will be conducted by John Nield, school psychologist and director of the center.

Some of the topics to be discussed will be... "Does your child refuse to eat?" "Does he fight with his brothers and sisters?" "Does he wet his bed?" "We feel a responsibility not only to the child but to parents also and our program is set up to work with parents so they will have an understanding of our philosophy," said Nield.

Among other topics, the parent discussion group will focus on is "effective ways of dealing with children."

The public is invited to enroll in any of the Child Development and Family Relations courses being offered at the college, the spokesman pointed out.

According to the instructor of the course, Billy R. Payne, basic note structure, transposition, and general music theory will be taught along with major chords and chord progressions.

The instructor is a student at the college and a student body officer.

He has studied music theory under Dr. Von Williams at the University of Nevada, Reno.

Payne played with the Just Us Five, a rock band from Reno, has played lead guitar with the Righteous Brothers, and recorded and made public appearances with entertainers such as Dick and Dee Dee, Tommy Roe, Del Shannon, Jerry and the Pacemakers, the Kinks, and the Beau Brummels.

He has also appeared with major groups at the Purple Onion and the Cinnamon Cider in Los Angeles, the Cow Palace in San Francisco, and Peppermint Lounges across the country.

In 1966, Payne was voted the fastest single note lead guitarist by Bill Board magazine's annual revue of musicians.

College to Have Class On Indians

An evening course in "The North American Indian" is being offered at the Elko Community College during the fall semester, beginning this week it was announced today by Dr. Elmer Kuntz, head of the college.

The course will include an archaeological field exercise under the direction of Mary Rusco, archaeologist with the Nevada Archaeological Survey, University of Nevada, Reno. The exercise will include an actual excavation of a site in Elko County Dr. Kuntz said.

The Elko amateur archaeologists will join the class during the excavation.

The course—which is being instructed by Mark Young, of the college staff, who was with Mrs. Rusco on the Nevada Bell Telephone Survey this summer—will feature films showing various North American Indian cultures.

College Offers Adult Education Center

The Adult Basic Education (ABE) Center at Elko Community College will open at 7 p.m. on Sept. 15. Any adult who has not finished high school is urged to enroll in a program of basic skills instruction. Interested eligible adults should contact Prof. Charles Greenhaw, Room 18, at the college.

The ABE Center will provide instruction in reading improvement, vocabulary building, spelling improvement, and mathematics. Levels covered in the ABE program range from grade one through the high school equivalency test.

In addition, the center will have available materials that give each student the chance to explore occupations in terms of his abilities, interests, and goals, Greenhaw said.

Instruction and materials are free to all adult participants. However, those adults who enroll in the high school equivalency program must pay a small fee for a textbook and the General

Education Development tests.

All instruction will be personalized and individualized, the professor explained. Students will be placed in programs on the basis of their goals and needs. Because instruction is provided on an individual basis, frequency of attendance is up to the student. He may attend as often as he wishes, depending on how fast he expects to progress.

The ABE Center will be open from 7-9 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays and on Saturday mornings from 9:30 to 11 a.m. Instruction will begin next week.

Greenhaw explained that because the program is individualized, it is not necessary to wait until a new class is organized to enroll. Enrollment is open throughout the school year.

The Center also hopes to provide babysitting services during the Tuesday and Thursday evening classes for those adults enrolled in the program.

Child Development Center to Expand

John Nield, school psychologist and director of the center, explained that the center at the college has built into its curriculum a training program which takes a specific point of view and prepares college student and parents with unique techniques for dealing with problems of child-adult relationships.

Although the techniques used in the center are new to Elko, they are used by other child guidance centers at colleges across the country, Nield said.

The objective of the program is to prepare college students for occupations where they work with parents and youth, to give children learning experiences in pre-kindergarten education, to teach parents by the practical method of discussing a specific problem before a group of parents so all may learn, and to present the knowledge and techniques used by the center in understandable language to professional people and laymen alike, the director stated.

One of the criteria for accepting a child at the center is for the parents to agree to attend one evening a week, Nield added. At the discussion groups the parents are introduced to the philosophy that is used in the center. They may also receive Community Service Credit for their participation by registering for the discussion group and may wish to have their families focused by volunteering to be a "Family on Focus."

The discussions are held to bring the many behavior factors of the children into the open and thus allowing the professional people trained in family counseling a better position to counsel and teach effectively children, as well as their teachers, college students, and parents.

'Drop-ins' Getting Basic Education

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story was written by Charles Greenhaw, director of the Adult Basic Education Center and English professor at Elko Community College. The center is held at the college on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7-10 p.m. and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. until noon for local residents who wish to obtain a high school education.

For almost 40 adult Elkoans, Room 18 of the old Elko Number One Grammar School represents new hope in education.

It is in this room that these people come—some one evening a week, others several times—to renew an education that, for one reason or another, got blocked in the teenage years. For these adults—sometimes referred to as "drop-ins"—the teaching situation in Room 18 comes about as close to the old English don (tutorial) arrangement as can be found in modern education.

The Adult Basic Education Center at Elko Community College is presently located in Room 18, where several of the adults now enrolled once studied as children. But much has changed about the place, though much remains the same.

Where once a schoolarm taught reading, writing, and arithmetic, the "drop-ins" now study, reading, writing, and arithmetic on their own, aided by self-instructional texts, tapes, and records.

What makes this kind of instruction possible for a group of people whose grade levels may range from zero to be-tweeth? With some modification, the arrangement is much like that of the neely vanished rural school in which students from several grades studied in one room.

The modification rests in self-instructional (programmed) materials, which, when used in a step by step manner, allow individuals to begin where they dropped at and advance to where they wish. The programmed texts present a unit of information, provide questions and answers, and extend the information through successive frames. They constantly review the student, and progress tests are built into the lessons.

But the texts are only a method. Students get tired of textbooks after a while. So the ABE Center also uses a variety of multimedia programs designed by professionals. Records, tapes, and filmstrips provide systematic instruction in vocabulary improvement, in writing, a reading, etc. Media programs

phrases, and sentences are projected on the wall for both students to see.

in computational and spelling skills search out an individual's weaknesses and help him correct them in a way that no traditional approach can.

And what does the ABE staff think of the program? "Well, I tend to look upon it as a very important mission—an open invitation to those who got lost and who now sincerely want to learn. It's great. And it's also fun. Why one night we all sat around listening to a recording of Macbeth," said Macksene Jensen, an aid for the program.

"It really gets to the heart of a lot of people's problems. People keep coming back, though nobody forces them to. We don't call a roll, but we nudge them with a friendly reminder once in a while. They keep coming back because the program deals with what they haven't learned in a way they can learn. One of our jobs, of

course, is to encourage people to learn, but, really, we don't have to do much encouraging, just be friendly, really. When a person who never learned percentages and decimals starts answering problems correctly on his own, he's plenty encouraged. There is a lot of satisfaction in learning. Students express their approval and appreciation in much the same way," Mrs. Jensen added.

And who are the students? They are whites, blacks, Indians. They are Anglos, Basques, Mexicans. Some are in their twenties, some in their thirties, even their fifties. They are just people who need to learn basic things. A few have never learned to write, some have finished grammar school, others want to learn to spell. Sue Saunders, a biology and math instructor at the college, has worked in a hospital and is even tutoring people in medi-

cal terminology. And there are students who need help in preparing for the citizenship exam.

But the majority of the students now enrolled in the program want to obtain high school equivalency and are preparing for the high school equivalency test, administered at the college. These people are convinced that more and more jobs are requiring at least a high school education for qualification.

No one connected with Adult Basic Education at Elko Community College will go so far as to call it a panacea. For one thing, the staff is small and Room 18 is already crowded, although the program has been in operation only a few months. But it is working for several grateful adult "drop-ins."

The program is helping a few, but, to use a cliché, the

surface is just getting scratched. There are more potential ABE students in Elko County than most people realize. There are hundreds, in fact. Statistically speaking, nearly every second adult in Elko County is a potential ABE Student.

The ABE Center hopes to expand to other areas of the county in the future. But expansion depends on funding. And although the program is not expensive, the logistical problems in serving widely separated communities in vast Elko County are great. Furthermore, the success of the program depends on the skill and enthusiasm of the staff, and persons, trained to work with adult "drop-ins", don't grow like sagebrush.

But a start has been made, and for adult Elkoans in need of basic skills training the future is brighter.

Extension Center of College to be Here Aug 8

On July 26, at the Elko Community College in Elko a meeting was held to discuss the possibilities of forming an Extension Center of the Elko Community College at Wells. It was decided at that time that the possibilities were entirely feasible and the Extension Center became official. Mrs. James Snedeker became the co-ordinator for the Extension Center and work was begun immediately to organize courses and curriculum which will meet the needs of the communities of Wells, Jackpot, Montel's and Wendover.

All classes will be held in the Wells High School unless instructors have other prefer-

ences, or unless the outlying communities can get a minimum enrollment of 15 students (for the College Accredited courses) or 10 students (for the Community Service and Technical Training courses). If such an enrollment is obtained in the outlying districts, and if it's possible, the class will then be taken to the individual communities.

In Wells, a minimum enrollment in the College Parallel classes will be 15, and the minimum enrollment in the Vocational Technical Training courses, or the community service courses, will be 10.

The Extension Center is a College Accredited Institution, and at the time of registration,

those students interested in taking transferrable college credits should seek guidance from the registrar when enrolling.

Registration dates for Wells are August 16th and 17th at the J.C. Recreation hall in downtown Wells, from 11:30-2:00 p.m. and from 3:30-6:30 p.m. In Jackpot registration will be at Club 93 Convention Center (Old Diamond Jims), Aug. 18th, from 5-8 p.m. Registration for Montello, Wendover and other outlying areas in the vicinity will be August 19th from 5-8 p.m. in the LDS Hall at Wendover.

This semester, at Wells, three courses will be offered which will apply to the degree of a licensed vocational nurse. It is hoped that all the courses which do not require "in-service time" in the community hospital in Elko, will eventually be offered at the Extension Center.

Vocational Technical Automotive Training courses as well as other community service courses are now being organized and will be posted at registration and announced before the late registration date has passed.

The Elko Community College Extension at Wells is subject to the same rules and Board of Regents as the Elko Community College in Elko. Tuition is \$10.00 per credit hour as is Elko Tuition. Community Service Courses may be offered at a lower rate. Most classes will begin the last week in August and will finish before Christmas.

Any further questions and inquiries should be directed to Mrs. Snedeker in Wells. People interested in offering Vocational Technical or Community Service Courses are encouraged to contact Mrs. Snedeker before August 12th.

coach at Elko Community College for the past two seasons, said this week that he had accepted a teaching position at a junior college in Massachusetts.

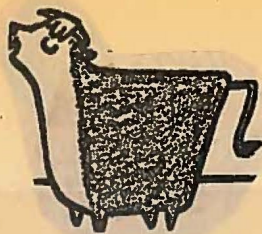
McCausland said that he will teach physical education and music at Becker Junior College in Worcester, Mass., during the coming year and will be leaving for his new position in August.

Aiazzi is a graduate of the University of Nevada, Reno with a B.S. in Agriculture Education and Business.

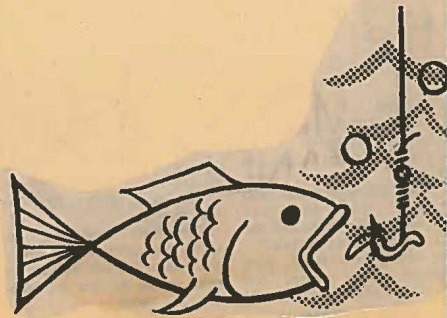

Don Manoukian, a graduate of Reno High School who went on to athletic fame as a gridder at Stanford and with the Oakland Raiders of the American Football League and as a professional wrestler, will be one of the guest speakers at the second annual Cowboy Booster Club Banquet scheduled for Tuesday Nov. 2, at the Stockmen's Motor Hotel.

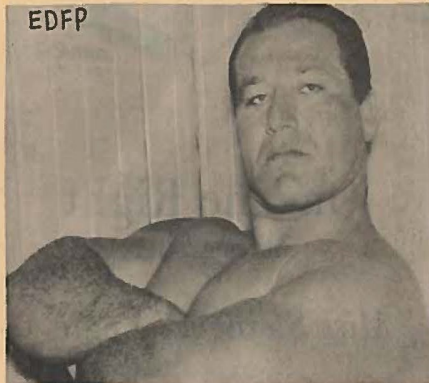

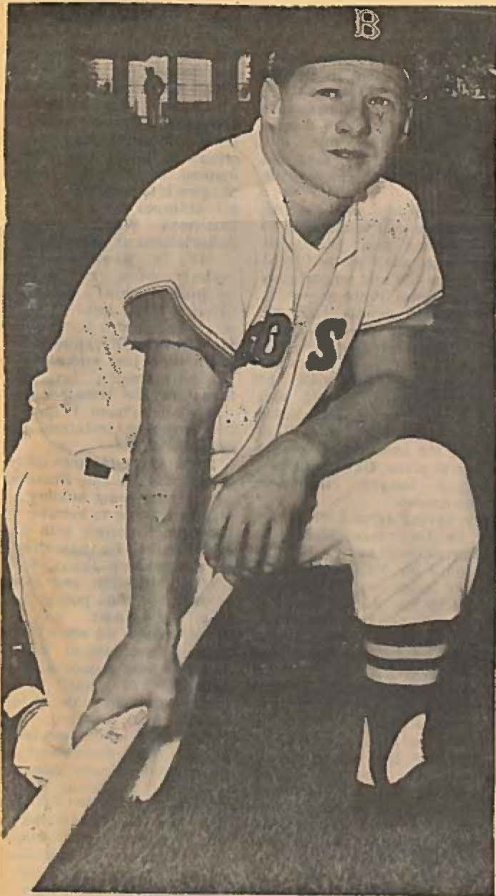

Jackie Jensen to Speak at Banquet

Jackie Jensen—who has the distinction of being the only athlete ever to play in the Rose Bowl, Shrine East-West Football Classic, World Series and the All Star Game—will be in Elko next Tuesday as a guest speaker at the Elko Community College Cowboy Booster Banquet which will be held at the Stockmen's Motor Hotel.

Jensen will join ex-pro football player and wrestler Don Manoukian and another noted sports figure, to be announced later, at the banquet which will mark the climax of the Cowboy Booster Club season ticket sales campaign.

The campaign—with tickets to all the Cowboys' home basketball games selling for \$10—is the only means of raising funds for the college's ath-

letic department. In addition to admittance to all home games, the membership card will entitle the holder to attend Tuesday's banquet, which will feature a spaghetti dinner and cocktails.

Jensen, 44, is a native of San Francisco and attended the University of California at Berkeley. He was named to the 1947 All America baseball team and in 1948 was an All American fullback.

He began his unique string of playing in all the country's top sports events in 1947, when he played in the Shrine East-West football game. He then was a member of the Bears' 1949 Rose Bowl team, but passed up his final year of football at California to sign a baseball bonus contract with the New York Yankees.

He was with the Yankees from 1950-52, playing in the 1950 World Series against the Philadelphia Phillies. In 1952, he was traded to the Washington Senators and in 1954 went to the Boston Red Sox.

Jensen had his greatest years with the Red Sox, leading the league in runs-batted-in three times and being named the American League's "Most Valuable Player" in 1958. He was named to the American League All Star team five times—1953, 1954, 1957, 1958 and 1959.

He stayed with the Red Sox for eight years before retiring.

Jensen has made his home in Nevada for the past 16 years and in 1968 became head baseball coach at the University of Nevada, Reno. He remained the Pack's head coach until this year when he was named Deputy Director of the Nevada State Economic Opportunity Office, by Gov. Mike O'Callaghan.

While serving as coach of the Wolf Pack, Jensen picked up his BS degree in speech and history on the UNR campus.

The appearance of Jensen, who now lives at Verdi near Reno, was arranged by Gov. O'Callaghan who had pledged to the Cowboy Boosters that he would provide the speakers for the second annual banquet.

A spokesman for the Cowboy Booster Club said that anyone not yet contacted, concerning purchase of a membership card, should call Dr. Elmer Kuntz at the college.

The Cowboys will open the 1971-72 basketball season, Friday Nov. 19, when Rangely College comes to town.

Cowboy Booster Event Slated Next Tuesday

Elko's second annual Cowboy Booster Club Banquet, a rally to demonstrate support for Elko Community College and its athletic program, is scheduled next Tuesday evening—and enthusiastic endorsement of the project has come from Nevada Gov. Mike O'Callaghan.

The governor will be on hand himself for the evening festivities, slated at the Stockmen's Motor Hotel, and has given a big additional assist to the Booster committee by arranging for the attendance of three prominent sports personalities: Jackie Jensen, of professional baseball fame; Freddie Little, former junior middleweight boxing champion of the world; and Don Manoukian, a former professional football player and wrestler and an after-dinner speaker of some renown.

This key support for the young Elko college by Gov. O'Callaghan is significant and gratifying. The institution, now in its fifth year, has come a long way since it was instituted in the fall of 1967, but it still is in the early stages of development and the kind of assistance being

provided by men like Gov. O'Callaghan greatly expands the potential of the school for future years.

That potential includes important educational advancement for not only the Elko area but other sections of the state who are following Elko's lead in establishing community colleges; and substantial economic reward for businessmen of the Elko area. The economic promise has been demonstrated in the growth of the college from a handful of part-time instructors and part-time students in 1967 to the present circumstance of nearly 200 full-time students and a full-time faculty of about a dozen.

With continued support, Elko Community College can rapidly grow into a rewarding economic and educational force in northeastern Nevada—but that support is vital to the attainment of the twin goals. Residents of the area need to match the enthusiasm demonstrated by Gov. O'Callaghan, and they have an opportunity to do so next Tuesday evening at the Cowboy Booster Banquet.—M

The extent of Wright's injury was to be determined today.

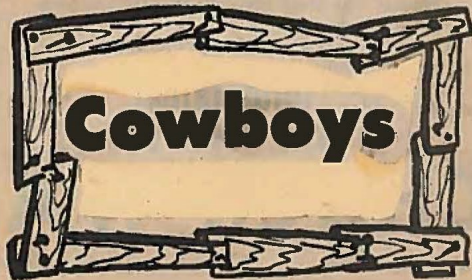

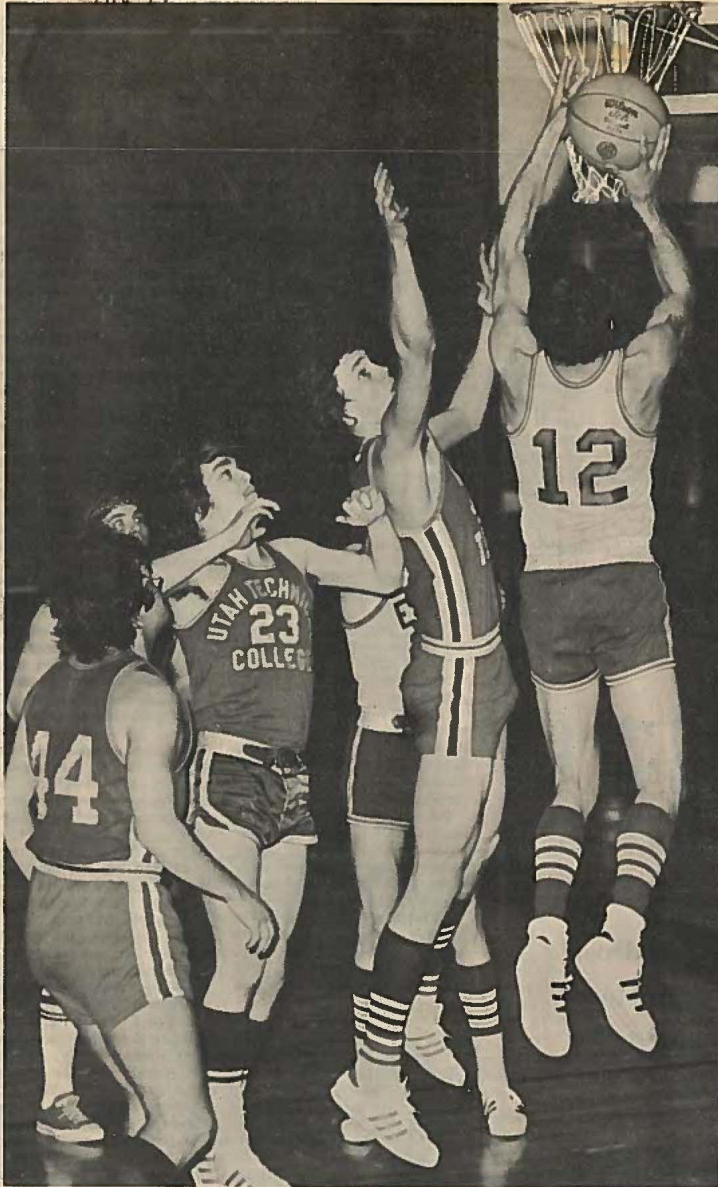
Utah Tech was Elko's lone victim last year and the Elko coach feels the Utah

A breakdown of students by races is as follows: 11 American Indians, one Negro, no Orientals, five Spanish-American, and 58 others.

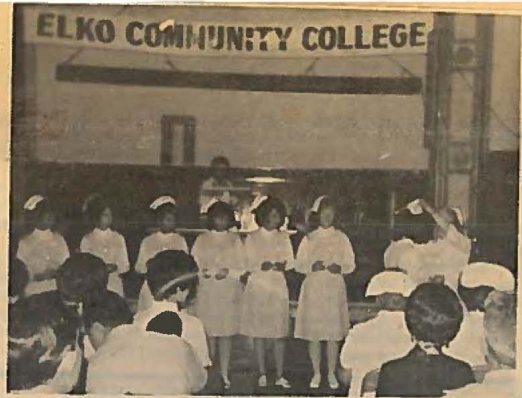
Men students total around 119 and there are about 99 women. There are approximately 64 full-

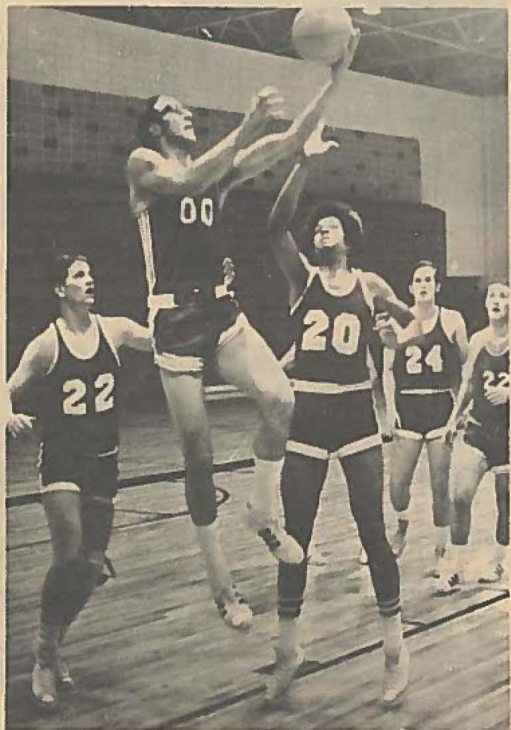

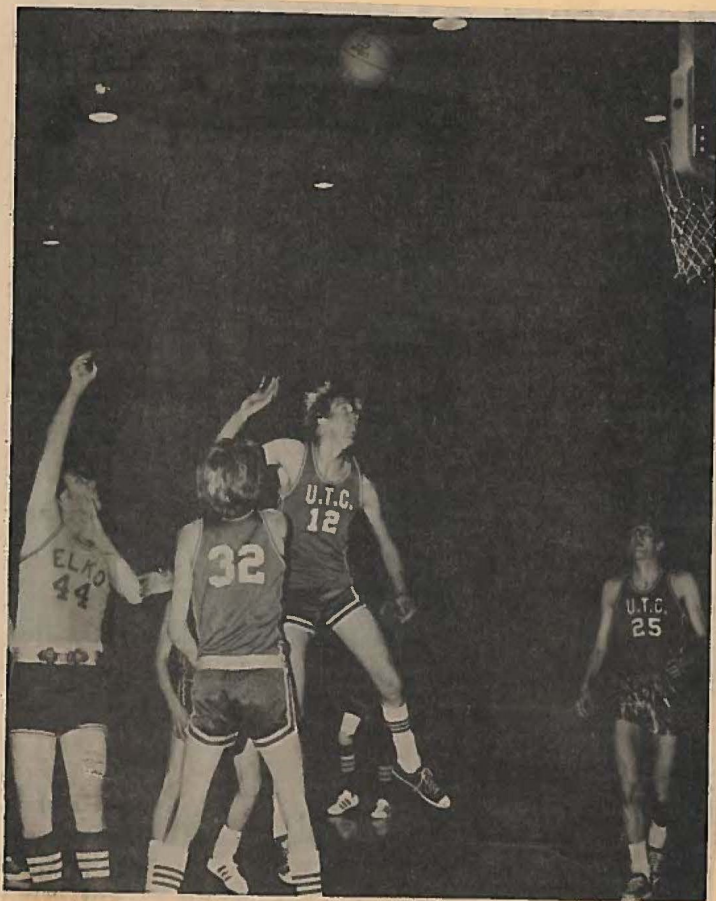

Elko College Wins Third Straight Game

Elko Community College led from wire-to-wire Saturday afternoon in racking up its third straight victory, 72-65, over Utah Technical College in a game played in Salt Lake City.

The Cowboys never trailed as they chalked up their sixth victory of the season and fifth consecutive triumph over the Salt Lake team.

The winners hit at a 47 percent clip from the floor and connected at a 55 percent rate from the charity stripe.

Elko controlled the rough contest and held a 33-28 halftime lead.

For the Cowboys, Bruce Aranguena, Lee Bitton and Don McBride did yeoman work in the rebounding department.

Aranguena paced the winners' scoring output with 19 points, McBride and Bruce Billbrey had 17 each, Bitton, 11, Howard Wright, 4, Alvin Wright, 2, and Harold Bogart, 2. Brad Savage and Phil Jorgenson both played but did not score.

Jes Dare was just about Utah's entire offense as he pumped in 35 points to take game honors. No other Utah player cracked double figures.

This weekend, the Cowboys will host the University of Nevada Freshmen team in a two-game series at Centennial Gymnasium. Game time both nights is set for 8 p.m.

Elko coach Bob McCausland said today that he had attended a meeting with representatives of five other colleges while in Salt Lake City for the purpose of discussing formation of a regional basketball conference.

Other schools attending the meeting were Utah Tech in Salt Lake; Utah Tech in Provo; Stevens-Henager College in Ogden; Stevens-Henager College in Salt Lake; and the LDS Business College in Salt Lake.

McCausland said the teams would play each other four times a year, with two-game home and home series being scheduled. The games would probably be played on a Friday night and Saturday afternoon, making the teams have just one night's lodging,

which would help their athletic budgets.

All of the schools' athletic programs are about the same age (two years old) and would put most of the proposed entries in the conference on the same footing.

Utah Tech at Salt Lake has approximately 2,200 students; the Provo school has about 1,500; while the others have between 600-700. Elko has about 150 students, McCausland said.

He noted further discussion on the proposal is scheduled in the near future.

Cowboys Meet UNR Frosh Here Tonight

The two teams will meet in the series finale tomorrow night at Centennial Gymnasium at 8 p.m.
