Stick mask orders are now being taken by the Mardi Gras Ball committee for the March 13 event to be held at the Convention Center.

Members of the committee announce they are planning a "gala" event that will be formal for those who do not come in costume.

Final Countdown on the Mardi Gras Ball

The last-minute decisions are now being finalized in plans for the Mardi Gras Ball, to be held at the Convention Center on March 13th.

A change was made to reschedule the buffet dinner to the beginning of the ball instead of the traditional midnight. The buffet will be open from 8 p.m. until 9:30 p.m.

The buffet will include relish and cheese platters, honey-dipped chicken drumsticks, baron of beef, cold roast turkey, cold baked ham, and a selection of desserts.

Each table, which will be set for eight people and named after a street in New Orleans, will be served with both red and white wine. Preferential seating arrangements can be specified at the time tickets are purchased.

There will be three open bars available throughout the Ball.

A dance band named A.C.R.B. will provide part of the entertainment, and will be playing several sets at intervals during the evening. Other entertainment will be provided by the Elko High School Choraliers, and by the Miss Elko County finalists from 1981.

A King and Queen of our Mardi Gras will be announced and crowned during the Ball. Due to the affiliation with the New Orleans Krewe of Minerva, the King and Queen will be referred to as the Goddess and her Consort.

In keeping with the New Orleans tradition, special doubloons, a replica of early gold coins, and crepe paper flowers will be given to all the guests at the Ball for mementoes.

The deadline for ordering masks has been extended one more week, according to Bill Chreste, local costume designer and member of the Mardi Gras Ball Committee, so that everyone can have an opportunity to place an order for this traditional Mardi Gras costume accessory.

Masks for both men and women can be custom ordered in a color which will blend with any planned outfit or costume.

Masks for women will be attached to a stick, with decorative ribbons. Masks for women will cost \$5 and \$4 for men. Mask orders must be placed with either Bill Chreste (738-5510 evenings) or Winona Perez (738-8916) by this weekend.

It is emphasized that costumes are not necessary to enjoy the Ball. In keeping with

the formal traditions of the Mardi Gras Krewe's balls in New Orleans, formal or semi-formal clothing, with no jeans for men or pant-suits for women, is being requested. Costumes are welcome and encouraged, and the Mardi Gras Ball attendants will be dressed in some of the costumes which have been collected in New Orleans. The Ball will begin with the

traditional trumpet fanfare and ribbon-cutting ceremony at 8 p.m.

Tickets may be purchased at Blohm Jewelers, Bodilly's Furniture, Four Seasons Floral's downtown store, and the Stockmen's Beauty Salon. The ticket price is \$25 apiece. No tickets will be sold after March 9th. All proceeds from the Ball will benefit the Miss Elko County Scholarship Fund.

Elko Mardi Gras Ball will promote pageant

A Mardi Gras Ball to benefit the Miss Elko County contest is planned for Saturday, March 13, at the Elko Convention Center, according to Stephanie Hanna, publicist for the event. The ball is planned to open at 8 p.m. with a traditional New

Orleans trumpet fanfare, and to follow the "costuming, etiquette and formalities" associated with its Louisiana model, Miss Hanna explains.

Plans for the ball include a dance band, as well as a midnight buffet and other entertainment, including a crowning ceremony for the Goddess Minerva and a King, both to be chosen from among those who have worked on the ball or on previous pageants.

The ball will require costumes or formal attire. Committee member Bill Chreste will loan several of his authentic Mardi Gras costumes to ticket takers and other greeters and he urges those attending to appear in costume and make-up in honor of the occasion, which celebrates fantasy.

Tickets to the ball will be available next week at Blohm Jewelers, Four Seasons Floral at its downtown location, Bodily's Furniture and the Stockmen's Beauty Salon, as well as from any committee member.

The price of tickets is \$25 each, to include entertainment and a buffet dinner with wine.

Committee members in addition to Hanna and Chreste include Winona Perez, chairman of the Elko Krewe of Minerva; Joan and Sid Chalmers, honorary chairmen; Mr. and Mrs. Jack Breaux and Mrs. and Mrs. Norman Broussard, all former Louisiana residents, honorary vice chairmen; and Connie Campbell, Bob Colon, Lina Blohm, Karen Rackley and Page Blackstock.

Tables will be set for eight places, Hanna explains, and anyone wishing to sit with a particular group should state that preference when buying tickets. She says anyone buying tickets before Feb. 27 will be given preferential table seating.



MARDI GRAS COMES TO ELKO

On March 13, 1982, the Elko Krewe of Minerva sponsored its first annual Mardi Gras Ball at the Elko Convention Center. At 8:00 P. M. a trumpet fanfare was played by Mike Cox and Nathan Broussard, son of Maintenance Foreman Norman Broussard. Ball Captain Winona Perez then proclaimed the ball open and a tri-colored ribbon across the entranceway was cut by Miss Elko County, Brenda Harry. On either side of the entranceway were floral arrangements of yellow mums and purple glads with bows of tri-colored ribbon.

In February of 1981 Bill Chreste was in New Orleans on Accounting Department business and caught Mardi Gras fever. He managed to see two parades, one ball, purchased several costumes in the French Quarter and was determined to bring Mardi Gras to Elko. As production manager of the Miss Elko County Scholarship Pageant, Bill persuaded the Pageant committee to sponsor a Mardi Gras Ball, the proceeds to be used for scholarships for Miss Elko County and the two runners-up and to establish a production fund.

Joan and Syd Chalmers were asked to serve as Honorary Chairpersons with JoeAnn and Jack Breaux and Shirley and Norman Broussard as Honorary Vice - Chairpersons. Winona Perez, Executive Director of the Pageant Committee would be Ball Captain and Bill Chreste would function as Entertainment and Decorations Chairperson. The King and Queen, whose identities would be kept secret until the night of the Ball, would be chosen by the Ball Captain in recognition of service to the Pageant. In choosing a Krewe name for the sponsoring organization, Minerva was chosen because Minerva was the Goddess of Wisdom and the patron of professional women. The primary purpose of the Pageant is to promote scholarship.

Guests passing thru the entranceway were greeted by costumed young ladies and gentlemen who presented them with strings of beads and doubloons, both of which were very kindly donated by individuals in the New Orleans office.

Entertainment was provided by current and former students of Elko High School.

After a trumpet fanfare, Paul Cacioppo then introduced their majesties, the Goddess Minerva and her consort, Mrs. Jackie Meeks and Bill Chreste. They entered the ball-

room to a standing ovation where they were presented flowers and scrolls proclaiming their reign. Afterwards, a receiving line was formed and dancing resumed.

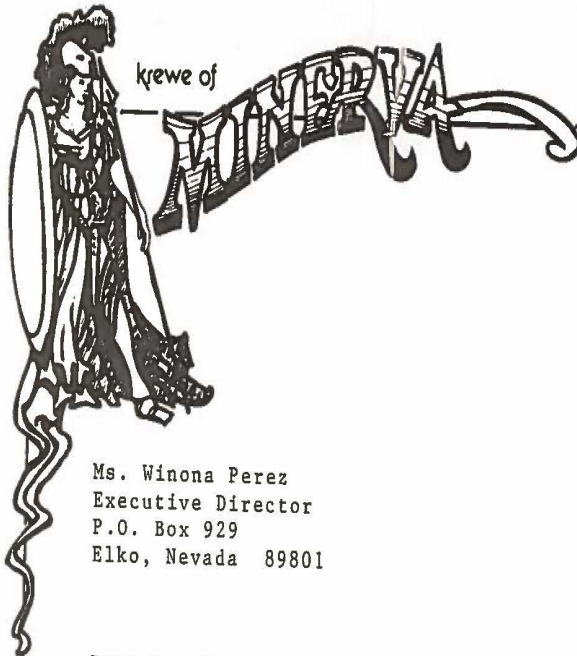
