State Education Group Praises Elko College

Members of the Nevada Higher Education Advisory Committee yesterday concluded a visit to Elko Community College with generous praise for Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of the school, along with members of the college faculty and residents of the community.

Committee members said they were impressed by the educational leadership shown by Dr. Kuntz and various members of his staff; and congratulated representatives of the local advisory board for the community initiative shown in establishing the school.

The committee toured the college building at Eighth and Court Streets yesterday and

paid a visit to Elko General Hospital where a course in practical nursing is conducted by Mrs. Delna Day under the auspices of the college.

During business sessions Monday evening and yesterday, the committee voted to conduct an independent study aimed at making recommendations regarding sites for new community colleges in both Las Vegas and the Reno area. A consultant is to be hired by the committee to expand data already compiled by Dr. Charles Donnelly, director of a statewide community college system; and the committee hopes to make recommendations to regents of the University of Nevada System and to the state legislature regarding the most suitable sites for new colleges at the two population centers of the state.

A Nov. 5 meeting was scheduled in Las Vegas to review statewide community college planning with Dr. Donnelly; and the agenda for that meeting also will include a discussion of a code of conduct adopted by the board of regents and scheduled for review later this year. A subsequent meeting was slated for Jan. 7 in Reno to give final consideration to the community college site study at Las Vegas and Reno.

Members of the committee who attended the Elko session

included Chairman Gene Empey of Carson City; Zel Lowman, Paul McDermott and Dr. Robert Plehn of Las Vegas; Dr. Fred Anderson (a member of the university board of regents) and Barbara Vucanovich of Reno; and Assemblyman Norman Glaser and Mel Steninger of Elko. State Senator Warren L. Monroe of Elko sat in on portions of the business meeting.

College Looks To Golf Course For New Home

First Building Could Be Started In 1971 If Land Is Obtained

The land formerly occupied by the city's Ruby View golf course may someday be the site of the Elko Community College.

Discussion between University of Nevada and state community college officials and the city of Elko regarding possible acquisition of the old golf course land have already begun and the outlook appears favorable at this time for working out some agreement. The university has a section of land about three miles north of the city located along State Highway 51 which was donated to the college a few years ago at a time when Elko residents were attempting to have a junior college located here.

While there has been a trend towards residential expansion into this area, it is felt that the golf course site would be much more suitable for location of the college when construction is started on its permanent home, first unit of which is expected to get underway possibly in the spring of 1971, it was disclosed here this week by Elmer Kuntz, president of the Elko school.

Kuntz said that plans for the school campus, as discussed with Dr. Charles Donnelly, head of the Nevada community college system, would include a new classroom structure to be built on land remaining south of the proposed location of the freeway when it goes through the golf course. Eventually other campus structures would be centered around this area while the land north of the freeway would be reserved for administration facilities. If arrangements for use of the land can be worked out soon enough the state highway department will provide for a de- strain tunnel under the freeway to connect the classroom area with the administration building, the college president said.

Present discussions between the school officials and Jack Sutherland, city manager, indicate that the school may ask the city for an exchange of lands in order to acquire the old golf course property which is located near the high school and could result in joint use of some school facilities as is presently being done.

There is presently some 58 acres of city land remaining in the old golf course area. The highway department purchased approximately 12 acres of the golf course from the city for the freeway right-of-way, leaving the city with title to the balance of the land.

State Committee Sets Visit to Elko College

Members of the Nevada Higher Education Advisory Committee from all parts of the state will be in Elko this evening and tomorrow to meet with officials of Elko Community College.

The state group is a body appointed by Gov. Paul Laxalt to advise the governor's office and the state legislature on matters pertaining to higher education. Gene Empey of Carson City is chairman of the

committee and the membership includes several key members of the legislature and residents of communities throughout the state.

Committee members from this area include Assemblyman Norman Glaser of Halleck, a senior member of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, and Mel Steninger, chairman of the advisory board for the Elko college.

Members of the state group are scheduled to meet this evening with the local college advisory committee and members of the college faculty during a dinner gathering at the Ranchinn Motor Lodge.

Tomorrow morning Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of ECC, will lead the state committee on a tour of the college facility at Eighth and Court Streets.

Empey reported agenda items for the state group during its Elko session will include a report from an evaluation subcommittee headed by Assemblyman Zel Lowman of Las Vegas regarding the determination of matters to be considered by the full committee during coming months.

Elko College Spirit Still Flourishes

The remarkable spirit that brought Elko Community College into existence three years ago and has kept the school growing since that date still flourishes and continues to assure a bright future for the college and for the community.

Evidence of that spirit came last night when members of the city council gave their approval to a proposal to make the old golf course available through a land trade as a campus for the developing college; and on the night before when a group of volunteer workers met to kick off a fund drive for the college basketball team. The same spirit was in evidence last week when members of the city planning board gave their endorsement to the trade for the golf course.

Briefly, the land exchange involves 100 acres of land north of the city that was donated to the University of Nevada several years ago by Fred Harris and Mark Chilton of Elko and the approximately 50 acres that will remain at the old golf course after the freeway is built through the course.

Members of the planning board previously recommended that the old course be retained as a permanent park site, but last week reconsidered that position and gave their approval to the trade proposition. Both Harris and Chilton also have given their sanction to the plan.

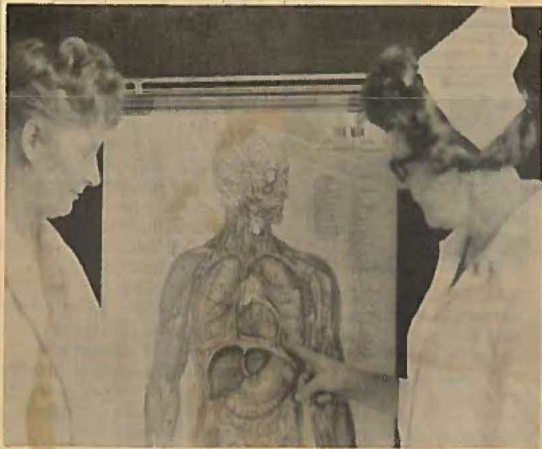
School officials explained the concept of a community college requires that the facility be as close as possible to the members of the community who may wish to use its facilities and for that reason the golf

course area was considered to be a more desirable location than the site donated by Harris and Chilton-- which was given as a prospective university location at a time when educational thinking preferred a degree of isolation for campus sites.

All parties involved have recognized and accepted this change in viewpoint as to proper location, and all have demonstrated a genuine interest in working matters out for the best interests of the college. Acceptance of the trade proposition now has been accorded by the regents of the university, the donors of the original land, the city planning board and the city council. The necessary paperwork is expected to be accomplished within a few weeks--and Elko Community College is expected to have its own campus by the end of the year.

Dr. Elmer Kuntz, college president, and Dr. Charles Donnelly, director of community colleges for Nevada, last night outlined to the council plans for the construction of classroom buildings during the next decade that would replace the present home of the college--a former elementary school used under an annual lease from the county school district.

So things are looking bright, indeed, for the long-term future of Elko Community College. From the short-term standpoint, we would judge from the enthusiasm demonstrated at the Monday night fund drive meeting that the Gov. Paul Laxalt-Eddie LeBaron benefit for the college basketball team also will be a rousing success.--M.

ECC Nurses' Program In Full Swing

You may not see these 12 on campus, but the practical nursing students are none-the-less a part of Elko Community College. The nature of their study decrees that their time be spent at the extended campus of Elko General Hospital.

Practical nursing is a rigorous 50 week program leading to a Graduate Practical Nurse degree. The graduates then have the option of taking the licensing exam and if they pass, will be licensed Practical Nurses.

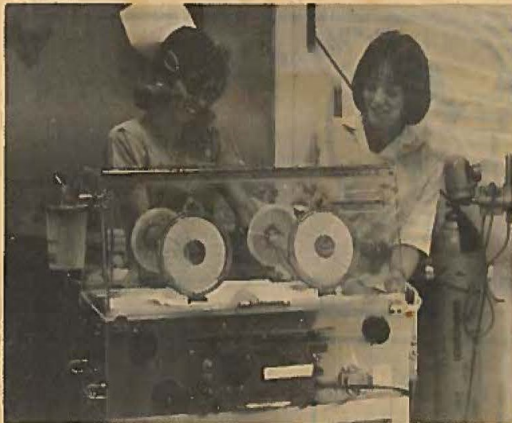
CLASS STUDIES

The students, having just finished their six weeks of classroom work, are now in uniform and learning through experience the various aspects of practical nursing. The six week classroom work is an intensive and comprehensive theoretical prelude to their clinical experience. During these six weeks, anatomy and physiology take the hurculean share of the time, but such things as personal, community, and family health; nursing ethics; legal aspects; and of course math are studied.

The neophytes are presently on rotation throughout the hospital learning the different fields of nursing. They still spend two and one-half hours a day in the classroom.

Land Swap Tops City Agenda *May 10th*

A public hearing on a land exchange between the City of Elko and Elko Community College will be held during the board of supervisor's regular meeting tomorrow at 7 p.m.

The hearing is a final step in exchanging city-owned property at the old golf course for land belonging to the college on the Mountain City Highway. The land swap was requested last year by the college, which plans to use the site to expand its facilities.

The board will also hold public hearings on an application by Doneal Thomson to move a metal-type service station building from 14th and Railroad Streets to a location on Idaho Street; an ordinance changing the sale, lease or exchanging of city owned property; and vacation of an alley located in an area that is now the Masonic-Odd Fellows Cemetery.

In other business the supervisors will consider:

—The presentation of a letter from the Department of Fish and Game unanimously approving the land exchange offered by the city.

—An application from the Babe Ruth Auxiliary for a special events beer license.

—Presentation of a letter from the Elko Broadcasting Company, requesting renewal of the land lease at the radio station location.

Elko College Gets Financial Plan Grants

WASHINGTON (Special) — Congressman Walter S. Baring, D-NeV., announced financial study assistance program grants today to Elko Community College.

Baring said \$12,000 will be released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Bureau of Higher Education under two student programs expected to benefit some 30 students in Elko.

Baring said the Educational opportunity Grant Program is for \$10,700 with an estimated number of 18 students to benefit during the 1971 and 1972 academic years. A matching amount will come from the Elko Community College grant program for compensation from student employment or from the institution's own sys-

tem for students who show exceptional financial need.

The second HEW program for the college is for \$1,312 and is designed to aid 12 students through a college work-study program to begin in the 1972 fiscal year.

Baring said that under this program the federal government provides 80 percent of student work payrolls with the remaining 20 percent provided by the school or an off campus agency.

Baring said that state-wide, Nevada would receive a total of \$275,500 for the two University of Nevada campuses in Reno and Las Vegas and to the Sierra Nevada Community College at Incline Village along with Elko Community College.

Lions Hear Elko College President

Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of Elko Community College, yesterday gave members of the Elko Lions Club a presentation on the community college system in Nevada and the Elko college in particular.

Dr. Kuntz offered the background of the community college and what lies ahead; presenting various parts of the state master plan for community colleges and an educational survey taken in the state.

He noted that the Elko school had 403 students during the first semester of the 1970-71 school year and 402 students the second semester. The estimated head count for the school in 1980 is 720 students, he said.

He showed the plans for the vocational technical building to be constructed on the Elko campus and said the goal was to move into the building in September 1972.

Dr. Kuntz was presented by Mel Lundberg, program chairman for the day.

Leo Puccinelli, representing the Boys' State program for the American Legion, presented a citation of appreciation to the Lions Club from the American Legion, for the Lions support of the Boys' State program.

Belated Start May Be Token Effort

(Editor's Note: This is the third and last of a series of three articles on developing a community college system in Nevada).

Nevada has an extreme inconsistency in its system of higher education.

It serves the talented upper portion of its young people with one of the best university systems in the United States.

But because it has virtually no community college system, it offers what is probably the worst educational opportunity in the nation to the large majority of high school graduates who can not qualify for university level academic work.

This latter group — more than 70 per cent of the state's young people — needs a community college system to com-

plete education for employment.

Community colleges can train for many more career opportunities than universities offer; and the state of Nevada needs community college training to meet its manpower demands in industry.

In many areas community college training is more in demand on the job market than university training. As a matter of fact the nation's universities have produced an over-supply of degree-trained people.

Realizing the extreme need for a community college system, the state has made a belated start.

Elko moved ahead of the rest of the state. It's citizens raised \$50,000 in 1967 to hire administrative personnel and organize a community college. The 1969 Legislature appropriated \$50,000 for the college at Elko. The

State Board of Education put up \$29,000. Howard Hughes made a grant of \$250,000 to keep the school open and to initiate steps toward a new state system of community colleges.

The Elko school is now in operation with an enrollment of slightly over 200 students.

A statewide feasibility study was conducted by the consulting firm of Arthur D. Little, Inc. Dr. Thomas Tucker, chairman of the department of school administration at the University of Nevada, Reno, served as liaison for the state to the consulting firm.

As a result of this study a state system of community colleges was authorized, and in January of 1970 Dr. Charles Donnelly was employed as director for the system, to begin work in June of 1970.

Since then the basic administration for a community college system has been organized, but the system has not been funded.

The state's higher education budget requested \$2,900,000 to continue the college at Elko and to start new community colleges in Clark County and Western Nevada (Washoe and adjacent counties).

The governor cut this request to a recommendation of \$1,100,000, a reduction of more than 60 per cent. He left the Elko request intact because the school was already operating. Clark and Western Nevada requests were reduced by 70 per cent.

Late last week the Senate Finance Committee was giving serious consideration to elimination of the entire community

college budget, except for the already-operating Elko college.

However, should the finance committee approve the governor's recommendation and permit limited expansion, Dr. Donnelly says some daytime community college classes will be opened in Western Nevada and in Clark County.

With the original budget request he had expected to start with 2,000 students—750 in Washoe and 1,250 in Clark. If he should get the reduced funds he would serve 240 students in Western Nevada and 340 in Clark County. Added to the Elko College this would make a statewide community college enrollment of about 800.

Dr. Tucker estimates that a fully functioning community college system in Nevada would serve more than 20,000

students.

Dr. Donnelly said the basic enrollment of 840 in Clark and Washoe may be supplemented by students in technical classes who pay a premium rate of tuition that would carry the entire cost of adding the classes.

Some of the courses that normally would be taught in community colleges are now being conducted in a technical institute at Stead under supervision of the University of Nevada, in adult education night classes in Reno and Las Vegas, and in the vocational technical center at Las Vegas.

In a position paper on community colleges, published a year ago, Dr. Tucker reported that the weakness of these scattered efforts is the lack of "identity" plus the high tuition costs for students. This limits enroll-

ment, he said. These are only meager steps toward saleable skills and provide opportunities for only a small percentage of the population in relation to the actual need for such training.

He said these scattered programs involve duplication and waste of money.

James Eardley, director of the adult education division for the Washoe schools, summarized what a community college will do that adult education classes taught at night will not do:

—provide a full-time day program,

—provide college credit and associate degrees,

—provide a school for young people to "identify" with,

—and provide a strong, greatly needed counseling program not now available.

He recommended that indus-

try take an active interest in developing community colleges, in the belief that industry will benefit from the vocational training and should get involved to expand training to meet industrial needs.

In his position paper of last year, Dr. Tucker recommended:

"... that immediate steps be taken to establish community colleges in the Las Vegas and Reno areas to serve a large number of youth and citizens not now being provided with the opportunity for developing additional knowledge and skills."

Under present budgetary conditions in Nevada, it appears that while a bare start may be made, substantial progress in the direction Tucker recommended will have to wait for at least two more years.

College, City Agree To Land Exchange Plan

Available Site May Help Get Better Priority For Local School

Anticipating that acquisition of a suitable building site might serve to raise the priority set by the state for a building project at the Elko Community College, Elko city officials and college representatives Tuesday night reached an agreement on an exchange of land which would provide such a site for the school.

The exchange would give the college some 58 acres of land remaining in the old Ruby View golf course while the city would take possession of 100 plus acres of land northwest of the city along the Mountain City highway currently owned by the University of Nevada. The land was originally donated to the university with the hope of attracting a junior college to Elko.

The request for the land exchange was presented to the city planning board and approved and then was presented to the city supported by Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of the college; Dr. Charles Donnelly, state director of the community college division of the university, and Mel Stening, chairman of the college advisory board. City Manager Jack Sutherland was authorized by the city to negotiate with Dr. Kuntz for finalization of the exchange.

The city insisted that a reversion clause be included in the land exchange contract providing that if for any reason the college should close or not use the land for a building program it would revert to the city.

Priorities are set by the state planning board for completion of the overall state building program which totals considerably in excess of funds available requiring that the most essential projects be undertaken first. If cost of a project do not include purchase of a site it sometimes can gain priority over one requiring outlay of cash for such a purpose.

The college building plan as presented to the city by Donnelly calls for a classroom building as the first project located on the lower section of the golf course land with additional school facilities to be added in the same area in the future. An administration building would eventually be constructed on the area north of the freeway which will cut through the golf course on a diagonal line when it is constructed.

City-College Trade Nearly Complete

The future of Elko Community College was given another boost yesterday when the University of Nevada Board of Regents voted to accept a land exchange between the college and the City of Elko.

The Proposal for the exchange of college land on the Mountain City Highway for the old golf course property owned by the city was made last year. The Elko Board of Supervisors voted to exchange properties with no stipulations except that the golf course land must be returned if for any reason the college should happen to fold.

According to City Manager Jack Sutherland, all that is

needed to complete the swap is for both parties to draw up deeds for their respective properties. The exchange must be filed with the county recorder before the trade becomes legal.

The golf course property will be used for the expansion of college facilities from its present location at the old Grammar School No. 1 building.

As for the land presently owned by the college, the city has no definite plans on how it will be used, said Sutherland. The approximately 120 acres is located three miles north of Elko on the Mountain City Highway. The property was donated to the college by Mark Chilton and Fred Harris.

April 17, 71 EOFP Assembly OKs Carson City College Bid

CARSON CITY (UPI)--A Carson City bid for a community college was approved by the Nevada Assembly Friday over opposition from several Washoe County legislators.

The bill, which passed in a 31-5 vote, would allow 200 acres of state land to be set aside near Carson City for a community college, but if the University of Nevada board of regents didn't decide to build one there in five years it would revert back to the state.

Assemblyman Randy Capurro, R-Reno, leading the opposition against SB-179 said the bill showed "legislative intent" to put the community college in Carson City.

"I think there has to be much more investigation," he said. Capurro said the legislature should wait until the university completes its study on where to locate the college.

He said he wasn't advocating putting the school in Reno, but said there were more people living in Washoe County and transportation could be a problem if the college wasn't located in a population center.

"We have plenty of time to donate land," he said. Capurro said there presently wasn't any money to construct community college buildings and the next session of the legislature could donate land.

But Assemblyman John Homer, R-Carson City, said it would be greedy if Washoe County lawmakers were suggesting that the college be located there. He said the university is already in Reno and a community college should be "somewhere other than Reno or Las Vegas."

Elko College Gets Grant Of \$68,519

Approval of a \$68,519 federal grant to assist in the construction of the first building on the permanent campus of Elko Community College was announced today by members of Nevada's Congressional delegation.

Reports from Senators Alan Bible and Howard Cannon and Congressman Walter Baring said the federal funds were awarded to the Elko college under a higher education facilities instruction program of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Officials of the college earlier announced plans for the new building, which is to be designed primarily for vocational-technical education programs. Construction is expected to start next fall, with an anticipated completion date of July, 1972. The building will be on the site of the old municipal golf course.

A budget for the new building adopted by school officials last month called for a total cost of \$538,000, to be funded by \$375,000 appropriated by the recent session of the legislature, \$90,000 from a bond issue to be paid out by student fees and \$68,000 from the federal grant announced today.

Elko College Bill Clears Committee

Elko Assemblyman Roy Young today notified officials at Elko Community College that a bill to appropriate \$375,000 for the construction of a vocational education building for the Elko college has received a "do pass" recommendation from the finance committee of the state senate.

Assemblyman Young, who introduced the bill with Assemblyman Norman Glaser of Elko, called from Carson City to report the bill had cleared the senate finance committee and was recommended for passage by the full senate.

The bill earlier was approved by the assembly ways and means committee, of which Young is chairman, and Monday passed the full assembly by a 35-1 vote.

In addition to the state appropriation of \$375,000, the bill authorized the issuance of \$90,000 worth of revenue bonds (to be retired by student fees) and the acceptance of federal and private funds for construction of the building.

Bill Seeks Money for Elko College

CARSON CITY (UPI) — A bill providing for the state to grant \$561,000 to construct or acquire an instructional building for the Elko Community College, was introduced in the Assembly Monday by Democrat Norman Glaser and Republican Roy Young, both of Elko.

The measure provides the University of Nevada would issue \$90,000 in revenue bonds towards the construction costs and the university regents would be authorized to accept \$68,000 in federal or private funds for the school.

The \$561,000 is above the capital improvement recommendations of Gov. Mike O'Callaghan who suggested no money for the Elko Community College building program.

Elko Group Requests New College Building

Testimony in support of a proposal to construct a vocational training building for Elko Community College was presented to the Nevada legislature today by a delegation of Elko residents.

The group from Elko was led by Mike Marfisi, chairman of the college advisory board. Other Elkoans taking part in the presentation included Dr. Hugh Collett, a member of both the college board and the school board; Jerry Warren of the college board; and Don Elser, vocational education director for the school district. Several other Elkoans were in

Carson City to support the measure.

The group was scheduled to appear in support of a bill proposing state appropriations of \$561,000 for a new college building before a joint meeting of the senate finance committee and the assembly ways and means and education committees. Later in the day they were slated to make a similar presentation to Lt. Gov. Harry Reid.

Arrangements for the meetings with legislators and Reid were made by State Senator Warren L. (Snowy) Monroe of Elko. A bill calling

for the appropriation for the Elko college building was introduced earlier this week by Elko County Assemblymen Roy Young and Norman Glaser. Young also sits as chairman of the assembly ways and means committee.

Marfisi traced the history of the school which was started in 1967 with \$40,000 raised in private money.

"In order for a community college to get off the ground we must improve our vocational and technical programs," Marfisi told the joint hearing.

He said both the college and high school were using the present facilities jointly and there was no overlapping.

"It is the ultimate in cross use of all educational facilities in Elko," Marfisi said.

Dr. Collett said the college would serve as a model for the state. He outlined programs and the joint uses of the facilities. He said, "We need this building right today. There is a great urgency."

Marfisi said, "We can't make do. It's impossible." He said Elko was started as a pilot project and now the state must help bring it to its full-blown completion.

"We must have the opportunity to develop in the vocational technical area," Marfisi said.

The committees took no action on the bill.

Committee Approves ECC Vo-Ed Building

Approval of an appropriation of \$375,000 for a new vocational education building for Elko Community College was voted yesterday by the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, after the committee made several reductions in construction projects proposed in the governor's budget.

The Ways and Means Committee, under the chairmanship of Roy Young of Elko, decided to give the University of Nevada System \$1 million for site development work on Reno and Las Vegas campuses. That represents a cut of about \$500,000 below the recommendation of Gov. Mike O'Callaghan, according to a report from United Press International.

Committee members also trimmed \$114,000 from proposed construction costs of five cottages at a children's home in Boulder City. The action came after Las Vegas contractor George Brookman (husband of Assemblywoman El-

leen Brookman) testified projected costs of \$32 per square foot seemed high.

The committee also voted to reduce the general fund appropriation for the Lake Mead Fish Hatchery by \$100,000. This amount would have to be raised from other sources when the project is undertaken.

Approval of the \$375,000 by Young's committee was voted despite the fact the new building for Elko was not in the governor's budget. College officials had requested a state appropriation of \$561,000 to be matched with a \$90,000 revenue bond to be paid off by student fees and with federal funds to erect a building on the newly designated Elko Community College campus, which formerly was the municipal golf course here.

The requested vocational education building would allow the Elko college to carry out a pilot project program designated at Elko by the 1969 session of the legislature, a college spokesman explained. The college presently is conducting classes in the former Elko Grammar School No. 1, which was made available on an annual lease basis by the Elko County School District, but which has no facilities for vocational training.

Med School, College Top Regents Agenda

RENO (UPI) — The medical school at Reno and the statewide community college system topped the agenda as the University of Nevada Board of Regents opened a two-day meeting today.

Regents were to tour remodeled facilities used by the fledgling school of medical sciences. They were asked to approve for bidding a \$1 million health related science

building financed by federal and private funds and by non-appropriated university money.

First students will attend classes at the medical school this fall. President N. Edd Miller wants the regents to approve a sharply higher fee schedule for them. Money above the fee charged for other UNR programs would be used to equip the school.

Charles Donnelly, director of the community college system, was to discuss proposed recommended locations for community colleges in western Nevada and in Clark County.

Gov. Mike O'Callaghan's budget did not include construction funds but did provide money to get Clark County College off the ground. The governor also provided full funding for the existing Elko school, but Donnelly said the western facility would be at a standstill except for moving some programs from under the University of Nevada Reno curriculum.

Other matters on the agenda included an architect's presentation of the design for the proposed \$5.6 million physical education complex at Reno; presentation of a constitution of the associated students at Reno; action on a proposal to allow 21-year-olds to drink in approved housing on campus; presentation of plans for a Nevada youth center at the 4-H camp facility at Lake Tahoe, and a limited pass-fail grading system at Las Vegas.

Community College Expansion Plans Hampered by Budget

RENO (UPI) — Gov. Mike O'Callaghan's proposed budget sharply reduced University of Nevada plans to expand the community college system, Dr. Charles Donnelly, director of the college division, said Friday.

He told the Western Nevada

Community College Advisory Committee the budget would allow the program to "get off the ground" in Clark County, would allow progress at the existing Elko Community College, but would be at a standstill in western Nevada.

O'Callaghan, in his budget presented to legislators, slashed board of regent requests for the university but said he was providing full funding for the Elko Community College as well as a start for colleges in Clark County and western Nevada. He recommended \$1,300 for each student at Elko and enough to start the other two but he did not recommend any construction money. He said the university can use existing facilities for starting the two new colleges.

O'Callaghan's proposed budget cut more than \$600,000 from the proposed western Nevada budget and \$1.1 million from the Clark County School for the 1971-72 school year. During the 1972-73 year, O'Calla-

ghan proposed cuts of \$1.5 million in Clark and \$916,000 in western Nevada.

Donnelly said the governor's recommendation would take care of the seven courses transferred to the community college from the Nevada Technical Institute and the University of Nevada, Reno. He said he doubted if there would be any money left to start new programs.

"We'll get something off the ground in Clark County," he said.

He said there were only four programs transferred from the Las Vegas campus to the community college division.

Sen. Archie Pozzi, R-Carson City, a member of the finance committee which deals with university funding, said he would promote the community college effort and try to get more money for it.

"I think the governor could cut certain other programs and pump funds into the community college," he said.

"There is a large number of young people who are given educational opportunity after leaving high school taxpayers will get more their money in a community college system."

Elko College Board Revamped This Week

Community College at Carson City Proposed

CARSON CITY (UPI) — Sen. Archie Pozzi, R-Carson City, said today he would propose legislation to set aside 120 acres of state land in Carson City for future location of a western Nevada community college.

Pozzi said the state owns 520 acres northwest of the city which would be ideal for the college because it would be in the center of the population and it has adequate water utility lines.

"I'm not so naive that we would immediately build a \$1 million dollar building," said Pozzi. "All we would be doing would be setting aside the land."

He said the community college could be started in an abandoned building, such as an old bowling alley south of the city and then the campus could be built at a later time.

Gov. Mike O'Callaghan has set aside enough money to start a community college for western Nevada but has not budgeted any money for buildings. A site has not yet been selected.

Pozzi said in Oregon a community college was started

in a tent and later moved into trailers.

"We're not going to start out with 1,000 students...we will be lucky to start with 50 to 75 and then it will grow," he said.

"A community college is a commuter school," Pozzi said. "Everybody drives and there are no dormitories. We are within one hour driving distance of Yerington, Fallon, Reno, Lake Tahoe and Minden and Topaz Lake."

He said Carson City was in the center of the major population centers. Asked why the college shouldn't be located at Stead north of Reno where there are already courses being taught, Pozzi said the former air base is away from the center of population and the buildings are older which requires high maintenance costs.

He said a suggestion to have the community college south of Reno near Mt. Rose was not practical because "it is in the center of nowhere."

"Even the University of Nevada professors say it should be away from the main campus because some of the professors tend to downgrade the staff of the community college."

City Agrees to Negotiate Land Exchange with College

Expansion of the Elko Community College was given another boost last night when the Elko Board of Supervisors voted to negotiate a land exchange where the college would acquire the old golf course acreage for school property on the Mountain City Highway.

The request for the acreage was presented to the City Planning Board and then given to the supervisors with a recommendation that the city manager be authorized to negotiate with Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of the college, to trade 100 plus acres for 58 acres of golf course land.

Speaking for the land acquisition was Dr. Kuntz, Dr. Charles Donnelly, state director of community college division, and Mel Steninger, college advisory board chairman. Tentative plans for structures and campus layout covering the old

golf course was presented by Dr. Kuntz.

Both the planning board and the supervisors were very receptive to the land exchange, but the supervisors agreed that a reversion clause should be added stating that if for any reason the college should fold, the land would be returned to the city.

College, City Agree To Land Exchange Plan

Available Site May Help Get Better Priority For Local School

Anticipating that acquisition of a suitable building site might serve to raise the priority set by the state for a building project at the Elko Community College, Elko city officials and college representatives Tuesday night reached an agreement on an exchange of land which would provide such a site for the school.

The exchange would give the college some 58 acres of land remaining in the old Ruby View golf course while the city would take possession of 100 plus acres of land northwest of the city along the Mountain City highway currently owned by the University of Nevada. The land was originally donated to the university with the hope of attracting a junior college to Elko.

The request for the land exchange was presented to the city planning board and approved and then was presented to the city supported by Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of the college; Dr. Charles Donnelly, state director of the community college division of the university, and Mel Steninger, chairman of the college advisory board. City Manager Jack Sutherland was authorized by the city to negotiate with Dr. Kuntz for finalization of the exchange.

The city insisted that a reversion clause be included in the land exchange contract providing that if for any reason the college should close or not use the land for a building program it would revert to the city.

Priorities are set by the state planning board for completion of the overall state building program which totals considerably in excess of funds available requiring that the most essential projects be undertaken first. If cost of a project do not include purchase of a site it sometimes can gain priority over one requiring outlay of cash for such a purpose.

The college building plan as presented to the city by Donnelly calls for a classroom building as the first project located on the lower section of the golf course land with additional school facilities to be added in the same area in the future. An administration building would eventually be constructed on the area north of the freeway which will cut through the golf course on a diagonal line when it is constructed.

There will be time for questions and answers between the audience and the panelists."

He explained the session in Elko will be the seventh such meeting to be staged in the state, with an objective of developing a state wide coordinated plan of adult education which can be used by residents interested in upgrading their education.

**Board of Regents
Meet in Elko Today**

The community college system in Nevada was to top the agenda when the University of Nevada Board of Regents began its monthly business session in Elko today.

The regents will also attend tonight's commencement exercises at Elko Community College.

The regents will discuss the recommendations of Charles Donnelly, the president of the community college system. The regents also plan to look at the work program for the next two years.

Donnelly said in his recommendation that two new community colleges will be opened—one for Clark County and one for western Nevada—on August 30, 1971. This would make the total of community colleges in the state three, with one already located here.

Donnelly said 340 full time students can be handled in the Clark County Community College, 200 at Elko and 180 at the western Nevada facility.

Western Nevada Community College will serve the following eight counties: Washoe, Storey, Lyon, Churchill, Mineral, Pershing, Douglas and Carson City. The college will have six major centers of operation to serve the eight counties.

The western Nevada college sites will be located at Reno/Sparks, Stead Air Force Base, Yerington, Hawthorne, Fallon and Carson City.

The Clark County Community College will have centers of operation in Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Nellis Air Force Base, Henderson and Boulder City. The college will serve the counties of Clark, Esmeralda, Lincoln and Nye.

The Elko Community College will service Elko, White Pine, Lander, Humboldt, and

Eureka Counties. Centers of operation will be located at Owyhee, Wells, Carlin, Battle Mountain, Winnemucca, and Ely. The central campus is located in Elko.

Donnelly recommended that the community colleges follow five basic programs—occupational education, university parallel education, community services education, developmental education and a strong counseling and guidance program.

He noted that the Western Nevada Community College will give first priority to those occupational programs which have been transferred from the University of Nevada, Reno. The programs include business technology, secretarial, associate degree nursing, radiology technology, culinary arts and food management.

Donnelly also recommended that an executive vice-president for the western community college should not be appointed and his duties will be assigned to Leon Van Doren, curriculum specialist in the present community college division.

The Nevada legislature did not grant the community college system any funds for new buildings so classes will be held in the various towns in the local school district facilities and other rooms.

The work program will also be discussed Friday and Saturday. The approved budget represents a 19 percent increase but was still nearly \$20-million less than the regents recommended for the 1971-72 biennium.

Reno campus president N. Edd Miller said the budget leaves very little actual free money left for his campus.

**Regents to Discuss
Work Program Here**

(UPI)—The proposed work programs of the four divisions of the University of Nevada system go before the Board of Regents in Elko May 28-29.

It will cost \$25.6 million to run the Reno and Las Vegas Universities, three community colleges and statewide research and public service programs during the 1971-72 fiscal year.

Salaries and wages will consume about two-thirds of the money, most of which will come from tax revenues about \$7 million from student fees and other non-appropriated revenues.

The programs developed by Chancellor Neil D. Humphrey and the presidents of the four divisions are: University of Nevada, Reno, \$15.8 million; University of Nevada, Las Vegas, \$7.4 million; Community College Division, \$1 million, including \$442,000 for Clark, \$260,000 for Elko and \$244,013 for Western Nevada; and Desert Research Institute, \$302,932. Additionally, \$602,657 is earmarked for the system computer center and \$371,707

for system administration and the university press.

A spokesman said UNLV will be able to add 22 faculty and 64 support employees, while UNR will lose 12 teaching and 25 support positions. No new programs will be started at Reno. The only new program at Las Vegas will be a baccalaureate in nursing.

The student-teacher ratio will be raised at both campuses. Average class size will be increased at Reno but will remain the same at Las Vegas.

Evening divisions have been abolished on both campuses.

Registration fees for Nevada residents will remain at \$130 per semester, but the tuition fee for nonresidents will jump to \$600 per semester, an increase of \$200.

Humphrey proposes elimination of the UNR Nevada Technical Institute, with its present course offerings being absorbed by the Western Nevada Community College and the University. He called for a study of a possible consolidation of the college of engineering and the Mackay School of Mines at UNR.

At the Community College level, new programs will be started this autumn in Western Nevada and Clark County. These programs will function without the benefit of a campus in whatever facilities can be obtained.

Elko College Gets Financial Plan Grants

WASHINGTON (Special) — Congressman Walter S. Baring, D-Nev., announced financial study assistance program grants today to Elko Community College.

Baring said \$12,000 will be released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Bureau of Higher Education under two student programs expected to benefit some 30 students in Elko.

Baring said the Educational opportunity Grant Program is for \$10,700 with an estimated number of 18 students to benefit during the 1971 and 1972 academic years. A matching amount will come from the Elko Community College grant program for compensation from student employment or from the institution's own sys-

tem for students who show exceptional financial need.

The second HEW program for the college is for \$1,312 and is designed to aid 12 students through a college work-study program to begin in the 1972 fiscal year.

Baring said that under this program the federal government provides 80 percent of student work payrolls with the remaining 20 percent provided by the school or an off campus agency.

Baring said that state-wide, Nevada would receive a total of \$275,500 for the two University of Nevada campuses in Reno and Las Vegas and to the Sierra Nevada Community College at Incline Village along with Elko Community College.

Roy Young Optimistic Bill Will be Signed 4-16-71

CARSON CITY (Special) --

Elko Assemblyman Roy Young expressed optimism today that the governor will sign a measure to appropriate nearly \$500,000 to construct buildings for the Elko Community College.

Young and Elko Assemblyman Norman Glaser introduced a measure in the Assembly asking for the appropriation.

Young anticipates construction of the new buildings located on the old golf course to begin around July 1. He said the state will

appropriate \$375,000, \$90,000 in revenue bonds, and hopefully Elko Community College will receive a two-year federal matching fund of \$136,000. Young said University of Nevada Chancellor Neil Humphreys is checking with the federal government.

"The six-year-old Elko Community College has been an uphill battle," said Young. "With the college having its own buildings enrollment is bound to increase. Presently, the college rents on a yearly basis from the county and is not certain from year to year where it will be located.

"Graduating seniors will now have more confidence the college will be operating than they have had in the past." The veteran Republican lawmaker said funding has been flexible in recent years.

Young, chairman of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, said for fiscal 1971-72, Elko Community College will receive \$174,200 and for 1972-73 it will receive \$199,000.

Regents Drop UNR PE Requirements

ELKO (UPI)—The physical education requirement of four credits at the University of Nevada, Reno was dropped Friday in action by the board of regents.

But the requirement will be considered again when the Reno campus has the proposed multi-million dollar physical education complex.

The regents also approved, after nearly a year of discussion, the interim rules and disciplinary procedures for members of the university community.

Reno student body President Dan Klatch urged the regents

to eliminate the physical education requirement saying the gymnasium is a "Health hazard" when so many students use the facility.

The gym was built in 1943. Klatch said the elimination of the P.E. requirement will solve some the problem of overuse of the gym.

The regents dropped the university-wide requirement on the premise that it will again be considered when the massive new P.E. complex is completed, probably within a few years.

In addition to the university code of conduct, the board approved student body constitutions for the Reno and Las Vegas campuses, and the Elko Community College.

The board agreed to a name change for the Las Vegas student body—from confederated students to consolidated students. Student body President Richard Myers said there is to be a study to consider changing the name of the sports moniker, Rebels.

In other regent action Friday:

—The board agreed to urge the state planning board to hasten steps necessary to build the UNLV physical education facility. Regent Bill Morris said he was concerned with the vast amount of time required to begin construction.

—Plans for an application for the Elko Community College for a grant of \$68,000 from the Federal Government were approved. The money will be set aside for the Elko instruction building.

—Married student housing rent for a month was increased from \$65 to \$75.

—Additional funding of \$15,000 for the University of Nevada Press was ok'ed. The funds are to be used for the publication of a book by writer Walter Van Tilburg Clark of the journals of Alfred Dutton, Nevada Pioneer.

—A motion by Morris to increase the Reno athletic fees from \$7.50 to \$8 was rejected by a 5-3 vote. Morris said the recent regent action to give 50 cents of the total fee to women's athletics was a "Reduction in revenue" for men's sports.

—Resident hall fees, including room and board and apartment rates, were raised by 10 percent or \$99. Beginning next semester, the one year fee on the Reno campus will now be \$1,089.

—The dining commons at the Stead facility of the Reno campus was eliminated. It will be closed not later than Oct. 1, and a vending machine area will replace the present dining room.

—Graduate student fees were increased \$2 with the funds earmarked for the Reno student union. This increase applies to Reno campus only.

Elko College Wins Building Approval

Last week's signing of a \$375,000 appropriation bill by Gov. Mike O'Callaghan for construction of an Elko Community College vocational education building means the Elko school soon will take an important step toward developing a permanent campus, and will be in a position to perform the pilot project role previously assigned to it by the legislature.

The \$375,000 is expected to be parlayed into something more than half a million dollars, with the addition of a bond issue backed up by student fees and federal grants, so that a building of significant size and functional purpose can be erected during the coming months on the new Elko Community College campus, which has been acquired by land exchange with the City of Elko. With the building, officials at the Elko institution can more effectively set the pattern for the community college system that will be created in Nevada during the next few years.

The governor's final signature on the Elko college building appropriation comes as a particularly gratifying event, because there were many indications during the early stages of this year's legislative session that money for the needed building would not be made available. Indeed, the pessimistic signs were more numerous than the reasons for optimism during most of the session. The fact that Gov. Mike O'Callaghan did not include the Elko

building in his budget weighed heavily on the pessimists.

Two of the forces which served to overcome the pessimism, and the opposition, were Elko County's two assemblymen--Roy Young of Elko and Norm Glaser of Halleck.

Young, as chairman of the powerful ways and means committee in the assembly, told proponents of the new college building fairly early in the session he believed funds for the project could be found, although probably not in the full amount requested. As the session wore on, Young was more firm in his expression of confidence that Elko Community College would receive its new vocational building--and last week's gubernatorial signature on the bill marked fulfillment of Young's pledge to college officials and to the people of the Elko area.

Although Young as ways and means chairman, was in the forefront of the legislative endeavor on behalf of the Elko college building, sources in Carson City indicate Glaser played a key role in achieving success for the bill by working closely with Young in aligning support.

Our congratulations to Young and Glaser--and to all those associated with the college who provided back-up assistance--for overcoming considerable obstacles to accomplish an important first step that will be of lasting significance to Elko Community College, to northeastern Nevada and to the statewide community college system.--M

Community College Division Suggested for Tahoe Basin

TRUCKEE, Calif. — If the Tahoe Basin is to have community college educational facilities, it will take "really imaginative development of how to take education to the people," stated Weston Alt, consultant on school district organization for the California Community College system.

Alt met here last week with Dr. Charles Donnelly, director of Nevada's community colleges, and representatives of the two community college districts which encompass the

west and north shores of Tahoe and Truckee, plus several other educators and administrators.

In an interview following the highly motivated session, Alt said the concept of a bi-state district has just about been set aside in favor of two districts working together to provide community college services for the basin.

"We asked Dr. Donnelly to analyze the Nevada community college situation, which is just getting started. He indicated he would not have a clear answer until after the legislature ad-

ditions but he was proceeding on the assumption that the board of regents' plan to open a community college in Las Vegas and the Reno-Carson City area by September was still valid," Alt explained.

Carrying these plans a step further, community college services are contemplated for the Nevada side of the Tahoe Basin by the 1974-75 term, Alt continued.

"This time schedule fits in well with the California law which requires all areas in California to be in a community college district by September, 1975," he said.

Large District

Complementing the district on the Nevada side could be an "east of the Sierra" district, which would stretch approximately 300 miles from Inyo County to Sierra County, Alt added.

About 1,000 day students could be expected to attend one or two main campus centers and satellite service areas that would make up this type of district, he said.

"It was the unanimous thinking of the group that one full-fledged campus would not serve the area and would have to resolve itself into two campus centers, one at each end of the

lake. In addition, there would be the necessity for satellite service areas up and down the length of the district to be served. This would be a unique situation," Alt commented.

He pointed out there would be enough students to make such a district feasible.

"We would work jointly with Nevada on such things as regional planning of sites, curriculum and facilities and use such concepts as regional residency or a closest college policy to solve the problems of residency and out-of-state tuition. We would have to work out an exchange of students program to avoid a duplication of effort.

"On paper, this looks like it could work quite well. It would be a high cost program because of the spread of population. Legislation by both states would be necessary to make it function.

"We are talking about things such as mobile laboratories, traveling instructors and closed circuit television," Alt continued.

"Everyone at the meeting was enthused. There was an excellent feeling among those present for some type of regional community college district," he concluded.

Elko College to Take Part in US Project

Approximately 130 Elko Community College students are expected to participate in a nation-wide project studying change in community and junior colleges.

Under the direction of Bernard Sadowski, dean of instruction, a scientific sampling of students and faculty here will be requested to respond to questionnaires provided by The American College Testing Program (ACT). Nationally, the study is sponsored by the American Association of Junior Colleges and funded by a grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. It will involve about 20,000 students and 10,000 faculty members at 100 two-year colleges across the nation.

The project will examine the community and junior colleges in respect to change—the direction of changes, the facilitators of change, and the impediments to change.

More specifically, the research effort will focus on such areas as changes in student populations served, shifts in financial support, and trends in community re-

lations. Student and faculty perceptions of goals, current practices, and college services will be solicited for the purpose of determining just how well student needs are being served.

Survey questionnaires will be administered to a sample of students and faculty members here and at the other colleges selected to participate in the national study.

Elko College Approved by Senate Group

CARSON CITY (UPI) — The Elko Community College received the approval of the Senate Finance Committee today but members delayed action on starting new colleges in western Nevada and Clark County.

Some committee members indicated they may not go along with Gov. Mike O'Callaghan's proposal to open the two new colleges.

The committee approved the Elko Community College budget to keep the present program operating. But members indicated that a request for money to construct a new building would not be approved at this session.

The Assembly Ways and Means Committee has approved budgets for all three community colleges.

Sen. B. Mahlon Brown, D-Las Vegas said the state was short of money.

Sen. Archie Pozzi, R-Carson City pushed for approval for the budgets and said that Carson City would be a "tremendous site" for the one in western Nevada.

Pozzi said it should be located away from the main campus of the University of Nevada in Reno. "The big campus looks down on the small college," Pozzi said. "There is lots of jealousy between professors."

The university board of regents will make the decision on the site of the college.

Elko College to Offer Masonry Training Plan

The Portland Cement Association, the Operative Plasterers' and Cement Masons' International Association and the Elko Community College have entered into a contract with the U.S. Department of Labor and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to conduct a coupled program of a classroom and on-the-job training for plasterers and cement masons according to the college. Federal funds were authorized under the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962.

A six-week classroom course to familiarize the trainee with the tools of the trade and to teach the basic skills of handling various tools, materials and equipment to be encountered on the job will be held. This will be followed by a 20-week period of on-the-job training with the trainee registered as a bona fide apprentice under a registered apprentice training program. During the 20-week period the

trainee will receive 6 hours of related classroom instruction per week.

A college spokesman said the contract was instituted primarily to provide unemployed and disadvantaged individuals training opportunities leading to full employment in the construction industry where skilled labor shortages are critical. Other objectives of the program he noted are to promote and develop training programs that will expand existing plasterer and cement mason apprenticeship and training programs; to promote, develop and carry out journeymen training programs, as needed, to make under-employed plasterers and cement masons more fully employable; and to provide badly needed skilled craftsmen by means of pre-apprenticeship and journeyman training.

Applicants will be considered from both public and private sources. The cooperation of the local employment service office will be utilized to the fullest extent possible in the referral and testing of applicants the spokesman said. In each case, the final selection of trainees will be the responsibility of the local program sponsor. Applicants selected for these programs will

receive a training allowance for the six weeks of classroom instruction. They will also receive compensation for the 40 hours on-the-job training per week for the 20 week period of the on-the-job training. At the end of the 20 weeks, the applicant will receive compensation equivalent to the going union apprenticed wage scale.

Instructional materials are provided for in the contract. Cement masons' and plasterers' tools as well as hard materials (metal lath, plaster, aggregate, cement, lumber, etc.) will also be provided with contract funds for instructor demonstrations and student projects.

All programs coming within or under this contract shall be carried out in accordance with the constitution and laws of the OP&CMIA and federal and state laws governing apprenticeship and training.

All persons interested in these programs should contact Dr. Elmer Kuntz or Bernard Sadowski at the Elko Community College for the concrete masonry program, and Hubert Stenotsh at the Nevada Youth Training Center for the plasterers program. Prospective applicants should be between the ages of 19 and 30. The course is to start on March 15 at the community college.

College Tells Plans For Child Center

Elko Community College today released plans for a Child Development Center. The new program will be under the direction of John Nield, school psychologist, who has been with the college during the 1970-71 school year.

Nield said the Child Development Center at Elko Community College will provide opportunity to observe children through one-way mirrors, and to study the behavior of, and methods of teaching young children. Practical experience will be provided for the student seeking an associate degree in Child Development.

Child Development Center Being Constructed at College

June 1, 71

A new child development center to begin this coming August is being constructed on the Elko Community College campus.

The director, John B. Nield, said that the purpose is to "prepare college students to qualify for teachers aids, nursery supervisors, Head Start, and other Government sponsored programs."

Most college students don't get an opportunity to work with children and see the theories they've been learning. This will give the collegians a chance to observe youngsters and participate with them.

Ten to 20 children, aged three to five, will be involved in the program. Applications for placement will be accepted in August. A number of requests have already been made about plans, procedures, applications, etc.

Acceptance of children will be based upon parents, need, and ability to attend. Parents who need a morning babysitter and attend college and children who lack social skills for kindergarten will be given priority. A small fee will be charged to help cover expenses.

New equipment has been ordered for the room where the center will be held. One-way mirrors and video tape equipment will be used for observation. Some remodeling of the room will be necessary to install the equipment and to get ready for the class, Nield said. Noting funds for the center have been allotted by the state government.

In addition to the director Betty Kaiser will be supervisor and teacher, and one part-time faculty member will be hired to teach some nursery school methods courses. The course will also involve ECC's student nurse program as each nurse will be required to spend two weeks at the center.

The children will be taught to develop social skills and knowledge (counting, abc's, painting, independence, music, etc.) for kindergarten.

Recreation equipment similar, but identical to that in the Elko city park, Nield said will be used for the playground. There will be a sandbox plus plenty of room for indoor play. Thirty-five square feet per child will be allowed along with low room dividers which will make it possible to have one large room or five smaller divisions.

Beginning one week after school starts in August, the center will be open on school days. From then on, it will follow the college calendar with identical vacation periods.

Nield said students interested in the Child Development course, will be well trained in the Adlerian theory instead of knowing a little about many theories. They will be involved in one hour of observation per week and must take both Child Development 102 and Guidance of the Child. All associate

degree students in Child Development will be required to take three semesters of practicum with children and their families, Nield pointed out.

Psychology and sociology classes will be conducted in a home type environment. The classroom will be situated next to the center to facilitate observation through the one-way mirror.

Enrollment for these sessions may be limited to 15 per class. If more student enroll, Nield said other sections will be added.

Elko C.C. Has Books On Indians

Resource Center Contains
273 Volumes At
Elko Facility *April 1, 71*

The Elko Community College Resource Center now contains over 273 volumes on the American Indian. These books deal with Indian religion, oral literature, mythology, ethno-history, archaeology, medicine, art, crafts and aboriginal life ways. Among these is a complete collection of all of the Civilization of American Series now in print, published by the University of Oklahoma, a college press well known for its studies on the Indian. Of special interest are records and books on Indian music, and books written by modern Indians. Among the latter are *We Speak, You Listen* and *Custer Died For Your Sins*, by Vine Deloria, and *House Made of Dawn*, by Pulitzer prize winner N. S. Momaday.

In a narrative entitled *Among the Shoshones*, the author, Nick Wilson, depicts his experience as a white boy who lived for several years among a group of Shoshones. Wilson describes the habits of these Indians, and how they made their living while roaming the Great Basin Area.

The *Shoshonis, Sentinels of the Rockies* contains information about the Shoshonis from Beowawe, the Tosawis of Owyhee, among many others. Included in the book are pictures of Chief Winnemucca, Chief Washaki, and Chief Truckee. The book deals mostly with Indian life in the past.

Of interest to the Nevadans are three handbooks, encyclopedic in nature, published by the Nevada Department of Education. *Know Your Nevada Indians* describes Nevada Indian history and tells what they used for shelter, what they did for leisure, and how they have educated themselves in recent years.

Uses of Native Plants by Nevada Indians includes names and uses of Nevada Indian food plants, medicine plants, plants used for grooming, magic, smoking, bows and arrows, and other things.

Our Desert Friends is a former elementary textbook republished because of its information about plants used by Indians for food, clothing and medicine.

Other books about the American Indian include *Indians of North America*, *The Native Americans* and *The Pomo Indians of California*. The first is a book covering almost every aspect of the Indians, including their language, subsistence patterns, marriage and families and 28 other topics. The book includes 38 maps and deals with the present as well as the past. *The Native Americans* is a college textbook showing what Indian life in North America was like before the arrival of the white man. The last is about northern California Indians who lived in Sonoma, Lake, Mendocino and Glenn counties and were known for their basket weaving.

The Resource Center contains books on nearly every major tribe — and a few lesser ones.

Lions Hear College Cage Coach

Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of ECC, said the special fund drive was necessary to finance equipment and travel expenses for the new cage squad. He said volunteer workers are aiming at a goal of \$5,000 in the drive.

Gov. Laxalt, who has provided support of the Elko college on several occasions during its three-year history, made arrangements for the benefit appearance in Elko of LeBaron, who was prominent for years as a college and professional football quarterback and who now is an attorney in Las Vegas.

Later he played professional football for the Washington Redskins and Dallas Cowboys; and can now be seen on weekends as a "color man" for telecasts of NFL games.

Gov. Laxalt, who has long been a backer of the Elko college, made arrangements for LeBaron, now a Las Vegas attorney, to speak to the Elko gathering.

A spokesman for the volunteer group said today that anyone that has not yet been approached by a ticket salesman—but who desires one—can call the college and a student will deliver the ticket to the purchaser's home.

The college has lined up an impressive schedule of opponents for its first year of competition.

The first contest against Rangely was even through most of the first half, but then Elko fell behind and had to try to play catchup ball the rest of the way. The final score was 75-49, Rangely.

Elko was led by Joe Edgar with 14 and Jim Justus with 16 points.

Just plain cold shooting led to Elko's downfall the second night against Rangely as the Cowboys fell, 103-44. Elko averaged just 17 percent from the

floor in the game.

Edgar and Billrey paced the Elko offense with 12 points each.

Elko had shooting percentages of 37 percent against Mesa and 30 percent in the first game against Rangely.

Following the Lassen series, Elko will next meet Feather River College at Quincy, Calif. on Dec. 11-12.

(Editor's Note: The following letter to the editor from Bob McCausland, basketball coach at Elko Community College, is given special treatment because he has some especially important things to say about the young men who make up the Cowboy basketball team; and because we think the residents of the area who showed such enthusiastic support of the team as "Cowboy Boosters" will be particularly gratified to

receive the kind of report that is contained in the letter.)

Dear Editor:

At the conclusion of our first road trip, I would like to use this method to let the people of Elko County, who are the chief supporters of the Elko Community College basketball team, know what we really accomplished on our first road trip.

While the score in the three games was rather lopsided in the opponents' favor, it doesn't indicate in any way what was actually done by this group of young men. I am sure that a lot of the problems that we encountered on the playing floor were due to the inexperience on the parts of the players and the coach, and we totally expect to overcome all of these problems in future games. However, this is not what I wanted to talk about. The thing that I would like to talk about is what was accomplished in an area which I consider to be much more important than winning a game. The reports which came back to me from everyone that

we encountered, on the floor and off, would indicate that everyone admired the way these young men carried themselves while on the road.

For example, the referees in each of the games in which we participated came to me before the game and told me that they had never seen a better groomed, cleaner looking group of young men on the floor in Colorado in the last

two years. During the course of the game our boys exhibited the best traits of fine sportsmanship. There was never a word or a look to a referee which would indicate temper. In the event an opposing player was accidentally knocked to the floor, he was immediately helped to his feet by one or more of our players. In the event of our making a foul, an apology was made immediately. And even though we were badly outscored, we were never beaten. The boys never let their heads get low. They never stopped fighting or hustling.

This was so impressive, even in the worst loss of the three games, the game at Mesa, that the wrestling coach at Mesa indicated that he wants to send his son to Elko Community College to play basketball next year. In addition, on the Monday following the Mesa game, I received a long distance phone call from one of the players on the Mesa team asking if it would be possible for him to transfer to Elko Community College and play

basketball with us. He said he felt that a team with the type of over-all spirit and good sportsmanship that we had couldn't be held down long.

In Rangeley, the day after our first game there, the chief topic in town seemed to be the sportsmanship which had been exhibited by all of our boys. I was told that last year in many of the games at Rangeley, there were many fist-fights and even a riot in one game; and the people there admired our boys for the way they handled every situation that could have led to trouble. Their conduct in restaurants and motels was so fine that we were told everywhere we went that we would be welcome back at any time.

Because of the conduct of these young men, even though we are losing at the present time, it is easy to feel 10 feet tall as their coach. We, as the people of Elko County, have no reason to feel anything but pride in our first Elko Community College basketball squad.

Laxalt, LeBaron Set For College Benefit

Nevada Gov. Paul Laxalt and pro football personality Eddie LeBaron will be in Elko Nov. 24 as featured speakers during a fund raising dinner for the Elko Community College basketball team.

College spokesman Pepper Sturm reported arrangements for the special event have been made by members of the college advisory board and a group of volunteers who met last night to kick off a fund drive aimed at raising \$5,000 to meet equipment and travel expenses for the Elko hoop squad—which has lined up a 24-game schedule and has qualified for National Collegiate Athletic Association recognition.

Members of the volunteer

group will contact residents of the area during the next few days to sell season tickets for the 10 home games on the schedule—and those tickets, at \$12.50 each, also will be good for admission to the Laxalt-LeBaron dinner.

Time and place for the dinner will be announced later this week by Jerry Warren, a member of the advisory board who is in charge of arrangements.

Students at the college voted to adopt the nickname "Cowboys" for athletic squads fielded by the school; and the fund drive group last night adopted the slogan: "Be a Cowboy Booster." Banners proclaiming the slogan will be distributed throughout the community to publicize the fund drive.

Gov. Laxalt has been a staunch supporter of the Elko college since its inception, and the governor arranged to have LeBaron travel to Elko for the Nov. 24 benefit appearance.

LeBaron gained wide fame as a college quarterback for College of Pacific a number of years ago—when he regularly defeated University of Nevada grid squads—and later as quarterback for the Washington Redskins in professional football. He also played in later years for the Dallas Cowboys; and currently is a pro football commentator on weekends for the CBS television network.

Elko College Benefit Scheduled Tomorrow

Elko area residents are expected to turn out in force tomorrow night to hear Gov. Paul Laxalt and professional football personality Eddie LeBaron during a "fun night" benefit dinner for the Elko Community College Cowboy basketball team.

The affair is slated to start at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow with a free cocktail party at the Stockmen's Motor Hotel. A spaghetti

dinner, complete with wine donated by Jerry Warren of Warren Motor Co., will follow the cocktail hour—and a spokesman for the sponsoring college advisory board has promised an evening full of "prizes and surprises."

Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president of the college, said today tickets still are available and reported local residents not already contacted may call the college to arrange to have tickets delivered.

Added details were announced today for next Tuesday's "fun night" benefit dinner for the Elko Community College Cowboy basketball team.

A spokesman for the sponsoring college advisory board said the menu will feature a spaghetti dinner, with wine to be provided by Jerry Warren of Warren Motor Co.; and free cocktails will be prepared by a special team of bartenders identified as "The Lawyers Four."

The affair is slated to start at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Stockmen's Motor Hotel convention hall, and tickets being sold at \$12.50 each will be good for admission to the 10 home games on the Cowboy cage schedule as well as the spaghetti dinner, wine, cocktails and entertainment.

College Benefit Tonight

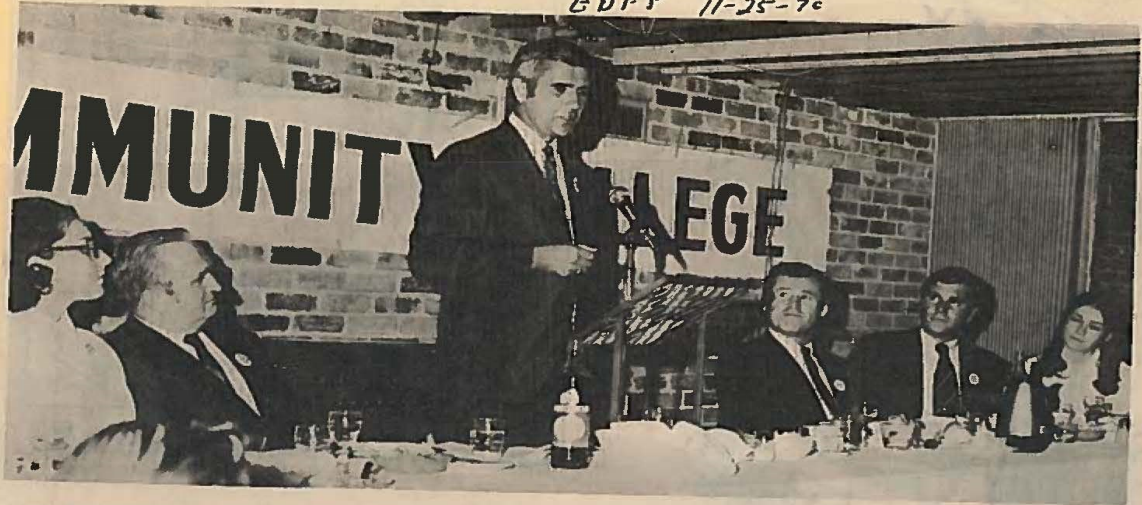
Sponsors of this evening's benefit dinner for the Elko Community College Cowboy basketball team today issued a last minute reminder that tickets to the affair will be available at the door.

Grid Star LeBaron At Cowboy Benefit

Making friends with "the big guys" is the secret of longevity among professional football quarterbacks, according to Eddie LeBaron, former signal caller for the Washington Redskins and Dallas Cowboys.

LeBaron, who played for 12 years in the National Football League, brought out that theory as well as relating several humorous anecdotes to nearly 200 "Cowboy Boosters" at last night's Elko Community College athletic fund-raising dinner at the Stockmen's Motor Hotel.

LeBaron, now a lawyer in Las Vegas, appeared at the dinner along with Governor Paul Laxalt, one of the state's strongest community college program backers.

Laxalt termed the Elko college a "beautiful example of self help" and labeled its inception one of the high points of his administration.

The governor pointed out that Howard Hughes—who kept the college alive with a \$125,000 grant two years ago—

was behind the school's latest endeavor, the basketball team, and had donated \$1,000 to the athletic fund.

LeBaron traced his career in football from his early days, as a "cow pasture" performer and "125-pound tackling dummy" for his high school team, through his appearance in the "Pro Bowl."

Along the way, LeBaron dwelled on his meetings with such famed performers as "Big Daddy" Lipscomb, Len Ford, Leo Nomellini and the fabled George Blanda.

He noted that in his first year in pro football—1952—the payroll for the Redskins was \$175,000, approximately the one-year salary of some of today's stars.

Among the highlights of his grid career he told of the first time he started at tailback for his high school team. His coach told him to run three plays and then punt. LeBaron noted he got off a "beautiful

Elko Community College's basketball team departed yesterday afternoon for California where the Cowboys will meet Feather River College in a weekend series.

Tonight the Cowboys will meet Feather River in Quincy and tomorrow's game will be played in Portola.

The team stayed in the University of Nevada's Stead facilities last night.

Elko coach Bob McCausland said he had been drilling his team hard this past week on offense and noted he hopes the new patterns and plays will pay off this weekend.

The team made its best showing of the season last Friday night, before dropping a close decision to Lassen Junior College, which Wednesday night upset the highly-regarded

University of Nevada Frosh, 74-71.

Listed by the Elko mentor as probably starters for tonight's game are: Bruce Aranguena (6-2) and Jim Lundgren (6-5) at forwards; Paul Bilbrey (6-1) at center; and James Justus (5-10) and Joe Edgar (5-10) at guards.

The other members of the travelling squad are: Paul Anderson (6-4), Bruce Bilbrey (6-0), William Hicks (5-10), Lynn Cunningham (5-10) and Eddie Williams (6-0).

The next home games for the team will be on Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 21 and 22, against Feather River College.

The Cowboys are averaging 50.4 points per game through their first five contests; while the opposition has averaged 91.6 points per outing.

Three players are currently leading the team in scoring with totals of 41 points and averages of 8.2 points per game. The team leaders are Jim Lundgren, Bruce Bilbrey and Jim Justus.

Feather River College turned on the power in the second half and defeated Elko Community College, 88-64, in a basketball game played last night at Centennial Gymnasium.

The teams will meet in the series finale tonight with the tipoff set for 8 p.m. Tonight's contest will be the final home game for the Cowboys until January 30, when the University of Nevada, Reno Freshmen come to town.

In last night's game, Feather River jumped to a 5-0 lead in the opening minutes and trailed just once during the night.

The Golden Eagles were controlling the backboards and the cold-shooting Elko squad could get just one shot per trip down the court, in the first half.

Tonight the team will meet College of Eastern Utah at Price and tomorrow night will meet Snow College in Ephraim, Utah. Last year, Snow was rated third in the nation among the junior colleges and according to McCausland this season edged Mesa, Colorado, 100-99.

And to add further to the coach's woes, his two biggest men will not be making the Utah trip. McCausland said 6-5 Jim Lundgren and 6-4 Paul Anderson did not go on the trip and noted his tallest players for the two-game series will be 6-2 Bruce Aranguena and 6-1 Paul Bilbrey.

An additional handicap was handed the Elko team Wednesday night, when Aranguena sprained his ankle.

The team has been mainly working on offense and rebounding this week prior to departing for Utah.

Listed as probable starters for Elko are Paul Bilbrey, Bruce Bilbrey, Joe Edgar, Jim Justus and Aranguena.

Others making the trip are Lynn Cunningham, Eddie Williams, Jody Dwyer and Billy Hicks.

The team will return home Sunday and then on Monday and Tuesday will entertain Feather River College at Centennial Gymnasium. Tipoff both nights is set for 8 p.m.

Guard Jim Justus has taken over the team scoring lead following last weekend's

games in California. He has hit on 30 field goals and 12 free throws for 72 points and a per game mark of 10.3 for the seven games to date.

Paul Bilbrey carries the best per game average, 16.5, but has played in just four games. He has a total of 66 points for his four contests, on 24 field goals and 18 free throws.

Lassen Junior College built up a good-sized lead midway through the final half and then withstood a blistering closing rally by Elko Community College to defeat the Cowboys, 75-65, last night at Centennial Gymnasium. The second game of the series will be played tonight. Tipoff is set for 8 p.m.

Lassen-coached by Elko High graduate Bob Jones-never trailed in the game although rallies by the Cowboys at the end of the first half and in the closing minutes of the game kept the small crowd cheering.

The winners displayed a deliberate attack and accurate shooting in never allowing the Elkoans to get closer than four points after the opening minutes.

Lassen jumped to an 11-3 bulge early in the game. Hustling Jim Justus helped Elko come back to 11-7, before Lassen took control of the boards and threw a pressing defense at the Cowboys.

The Cougar press bothered Elko and then when the Cowboys did get a shot they were cold and missed.

Lassen moved to a 27-11 advantage midway through the first half, before a rally led by Justus, Bruce Aranguena, Paul Billbrey and Joe Edgar brought Bob McCausland's Cowboys back to 38-31. The half ended with Lassen on top by five at 38-33.

Second half streak carries BMCC

Bob Brown and Aaron Dunn had a second half field day. The pair put the snarl in the Blue Mountain Community College Timber Wolves, who streaked to a 61 point second half and a race-away 97-69 victory over short and short handed Elko, Nev., Community College.

Elko, with just eight players on the roster, ran neck and neck with BMCC in the first half on the razzle-dazzle gunning of Paul Bilberg, who finished the night with 28 points.

The Timber Wolves getting 14 first half points from Brad Timmel, left at the mid-way break with a skimpy 36-31 edge.

What Coach Jerry Mosby told his BMCC basketballers during the break is not known but it certainly did the job.

BROWN SLASHED Elko for 24 of his 26 points in the second half and Dunn jumped off the bench to bang in all 14 of his counters.

Tim Wetherell, who finished with 17 points, hit eight in the second half and Timmel poured in 10 to bring his evening's total to 24.

Brown and Wetherell each pulled down 15 rebounds to lead BMCC to a 54-31 margin. That allowed the Timber Wolves to get off 90 shots, 40 of which hit the mark. Elko, meanwhile,

got to put the ball up just 69 times. It connected on 25. BMCC's percentage wound up at .444 while Elko was coming in with a .362.

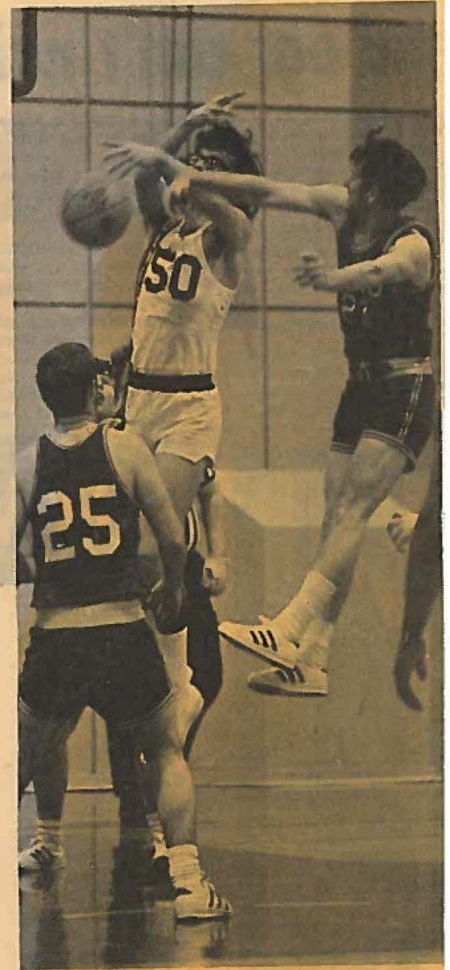

From there it was Brown, Dunn and fellow Wolves on a rapid-fire bucket brigade.

Elko Community College's basketball team is looking for a win.

The Cowboys will be trying for win number one when they challenge the University of Nevada freshmen tonight at 6 in Centennial Coliseum.

Elko lost its 18th straight game Saturday when it bowed to the young Pack, 93-48.

Coach Andy Matson's freshmen are 9-3 for the season but 0-1 in the Coliseum.

Nap Brandford led the frosh Saturday with 25 points and Van Patterson had 22 points.

Nevada played without starters John Davis and Chalmer Dillard who have run into scholastic problems.

Sophomore Paul Billbrey led Elko with 18 points.

Brandford has 17 rebounds to pace the Pack to a 60-25 edge on the boards. Elko played the first half and four minutes of the second before getting its first offensive rebound.

The Pack had some difficulty in the first half with the Cowboys' slow down offense but ran to a 26-9 advantage with five minutes left. Nevada led 40-15 at the half despite the Cowboys' 62 per cent (eight of 13) field goal shooting.

FROM MY CORNER



Junior college basketball is a well kept secret in Nevada. Many fans don't even know there's a Nevada community college playing basketball.

They know it in Grand Junction, Colo., Ephraim, Utah, Rexburg, Ida., Pendleton, Ore. and Walla Walla, Wash.

Those cities are some of the places Elko Community College's basketball team has played this season. The Cowboys have traveled 6,500 miles and played games in seven states.

Elko is probably one of the few college teams that has an insurance man on its bench. He is their "volunteer" coach Robert McCausland.

The Cowboys enjoy a few other distinctions. Elko sold 700 season tickets before the season started and is the only Nevada college to have only Nevada basketball players.

Only one thing is missing for the Cowboys. They're not winning. In fact, they've never won a game against college competition.

The Cowboys, who meet the Nevada frosh tonight at 6 in Centennial Coliseum, are 6-18. Elko's opponents are averaging 95.7 points a game compared to the Cowboys' 59.9.

The Cowboys' first game was a rude awakening when they dropped a 134-46 decision to Mesa (Colo.) Junior College. Elko was outscored 311-139 in its first three games.

Elko's longest game was in Rexburg when Ricks trampled the Cowboys, 156-62.

However, McCausland said he was pleased with his team's comeback the next night against Ricks. The Cowboys lost that one, 100-42.

Relief may be in sight for the Cowboys. After the game with the Nevada freshmen, they will play six straight games at home. Utah Tech, Uinta Basin, Rangeley and the Nevada freshmen will invade Elko.

McCausland, like his players, is a stranger to college basketball. His only coaching before taking over the Cowboys was in church league basketball.

He isn't a college graduate.

He attended Brigham Young University one year before dropping out.

McCausland said it wasn't an easy decision to take the Elko coaching job.

"I was spooked, I didn't know what to do," McCausland said. "I called Stan Watts at the 'Y' (Brigham Young). I told him what the situation was and that I felt inadequate.

"He told me to come over. He spent the day with me and went over their offense, explaining everything.

"I heard he was a great guy."

McCausland said he's incorporated several of the BYU coach's plays into the Elko offense.

There's also a strong Oklahoma State influence in the Cowboys' play. McCausland's team is using the 1-4 offense after H.P. Sturm, assistant to the Elko president, suggested the move.

Sturm is a 1941 graduate of Oklahoma State who says, "I got my basketball from Hank Iba."

The Cowboy coach said he also read a book by Florida high school coach Joe Cerevelo concerning the offense.

"I've put in more hours studying for this than I have for anything else in my life," the Elko coach explained.

The Cowboys run the offense remarkably well as evidenced by their first half shooting against Nevada's frosh. They hit eight of 13 field goal attempts but were trailing 40-19 at halftime. Elko lost the game, 93-48, but still connected on 20 of 41 field goal tries.

The Cowboys are always bothered by their shortage of height. Their tallest players are Paul Bilbrey and Bruce Aranguena at 6-1.

Aranguena, an Elko freshman, is the team leader according to McCausland. He's also the student body president.

Bilbrey is a smooth moving sophomore from Battle Mountain. He's averaging 22 points a game and has scored 30 and 32 points in contests this season.

McCausland was asked if he would coach Elko next season. "I'd like to," he said. "but it hurts my business.

"I've let it slide for three months to make this thing go."

It's been a long season for Elko but McCausland says he's hopeful the Cowboys can find some help for next season. Sturm is scheduled to attend the State Tournament while McCausland devotes more time to insurance.

Sturm says, "We're not going after being a basketball power we just want to develop a complete program."

Elko Community College doesn't want to be a power it just wants to win a game.

Maybe after a win or two, the news will slip out that there's a Nevada community college playing basketball.

UNR Frosh Tops Elko At Reno

University of Nevada freshman basketball team led from wire to wire Saturday night in defeating Elko Community College, 93-48, in a game played in Reno. The two teams meet again tonight, at 8, at the Centennial Coliseum.

The UNR Frosh took the lead early and were never threatened by the Cowboys. The winners held a 40-19 half-time lead.

Nap Brandford led the winners' scoring with 25 points. Van Patterson had 22, John Jackson had 19 and Alan Reed had 11. Paul Bilbrey was the only Elko player in double figures. He had 18.

Elko coach Bob McCausland said today that his team has had several good practices this week and looks for an improved performance from his squad tonight.

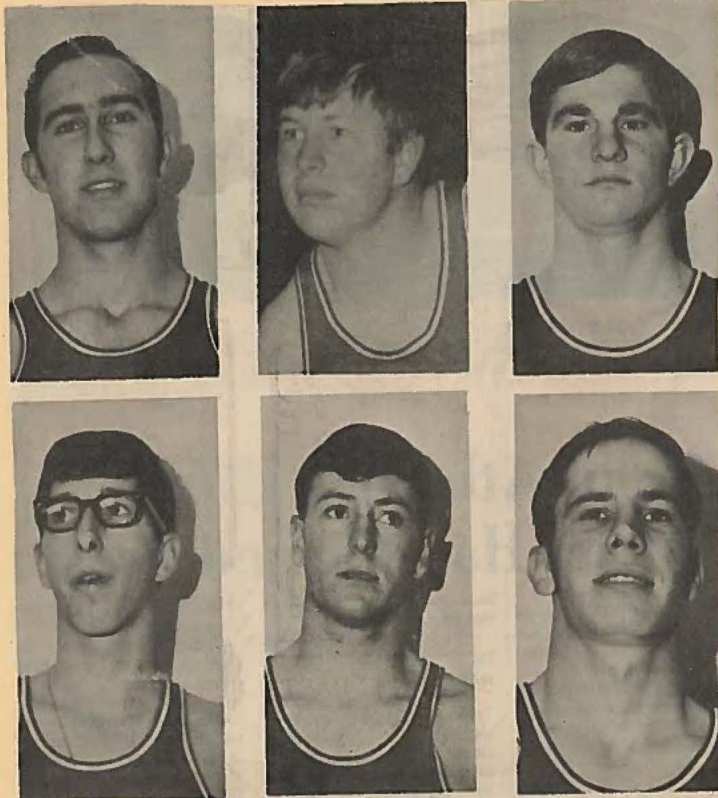

Cowboys Defeat Utah Team for First Win

The streak ended at 19 for the Elko Community College Cowboys last night at Centennial Gymnasium, as they took the lead late in the game and defeated Utah Technical College, 69-60, for the local team's first win of the season.

A jump shot by Paul Bilbrey knotted the score at 24-24 with 1:42 left. The teams remained tied at the intermission buzzer, 25-25.

Elko took a brief 26-25 edge shortly after the second half opened, but then the Utah squad took the lead once more.

Ray Frank and reserve Tom Bettin were finding the mark and the visitors upped their advantage to 42-37 midway through the final stanza.

At that point the two Bilbrey's, Aranguena and Jim Justus began to connect and Bob

McCausland's Cowboys got back into the contest.

After they once got the lead, the Cowboys were not about to give it up and worked deliberately for the good shots.

In the closing moments, the Utah team was forced to foul and Elko wrapped up the decision at the charity stripe.

Elko's Tom Anderson capped a perfect night for Cowboy fans as he hit a long jump shot at the final buzzer to make the count, 69-60.

Paul Bilbrey topped Elko and took game honors with 28 points. Aranguena added 19 and Bruce Bilbrey ended with 13. For Utah, Frank was high with 12 and Peterson netted 11.

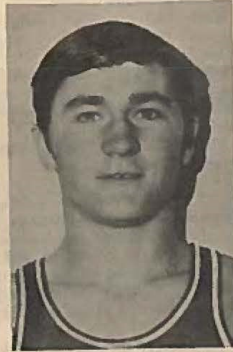

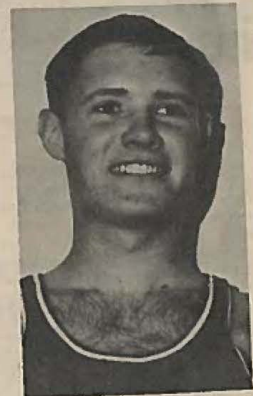

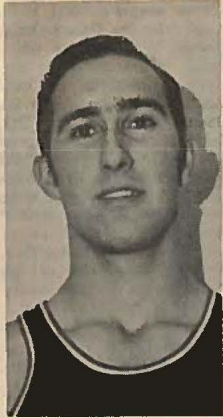
EDDIE WILLIAMS

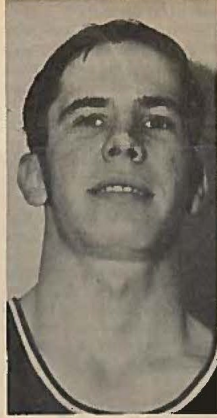
BRUCE ARANGUENA

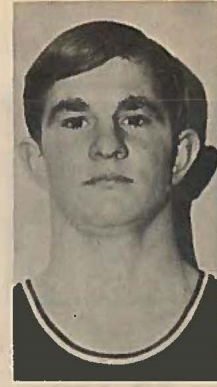

Rangely College had five men in double figures last night as the Spartans defeated Elko Community College, 103-57, to sweep the two-game series.

Last night's contest marked the end of its first season of intercollegiate competition for the Elko school, now in its fourth year.

The Colorado team held a comfortable 18-point lead at halftime—47-29—and then outscored the Cowboys—who were playing their fourth game in five days—56-28, over the final 20 minutes to seal the verdict.

The Cowboys ended the year at 1-24, but during its schedule met some of the top junior colleges in the western states. Listed among its opponents were powerhouses Mesa Junior College, College of Eastern Utah, Snow College, Ricks College, Walla Walla College and Rangely.

In last night's contest, Rangely moved to its first period lead on the shooting of Hal Kemerer, Lee Coleman and Dennis Roth—who closed the first half with three straight field goals. Elko was paced through the initial 20 minutes by the scoring of Paul Bilbrey and Jim Justus and the

rebounding of Bruce Aranguena. Coleman grabbed the majority of the caroms for the Colorado squad.

Mr. Sadowski is involved in developing and improving the transfer program for science majors. He is also ordering several thousand dollars worth of equipment for a science lab.

Among his many achievements, Sadowski recalls an experience in Flint, Mich. where he ran for city commissioner and took third place.

Although he is interested primarily in oceanography and ecology, his hobbies include clock collecting, golf, skiing, fishing, and bowling.

College Enrollment At Elko Hits 200 FTE

Enrollment at Elko Community College has topped the 200 full time equivalent student mark and continues to grow, according to a report from Dr. Elmer Kuntz, president, who noted registration will remain open until next Tuesday.

Dr. Kuntz said today 260 students have paid admission fees and several others have signed up for courses but have not yet paid the necessary fees. He noted some of the 260 who have enrolled are taking courses on a part time basis, which accounts for the figure of 200 full time equivalent students. The FTE total is calculated on the basis of 16 hours for a full time equivalent.

The college president also pointed out the enrollment statistics reported do not include students being

registered for a variety of courses in several other communities, including Winnemucca (where 30 students were enrolled yesterday), Caliente, Wells, Carlin and Battle Mountain.

He said college representatives were in Caliente today and registration is scheduled at Carlin and Battle Mountain on Monday, Sept. 28, and in Wells on Tuesday, Sept. 29.

The 200 FTE total to date at the Elko college substantially surpasses last year's enrollment of 181, Dr. Kuntz pointed out, and he predicted the final enrollment total for the fall semester this year will be well in excess of the 200 mark.

Classes at the college started this week; and Dr. Kuntz and other members of the faculty this morning welcomed new students to the school during

an orientation assembly.

Russell Lundgren and Steve Dollinger, both members of the faculty, invited students to participate in a number of activities slated at the college, including basketball, boxing, baseball, student newspaper and student yearbook.

Enrollment Is Up At College; Five Days Until Close

Registration of students at Elko Community College with some five days left in the registration period is far ahead of last year's total enrollment and additional names are being added to the roster daily according to Elmer L. Kuntz, president of the college said today.

He reported 255 paid admissions accounted for at the college office this forenoon with some 10 or 12 additional registrations on hand awaiting arrangements for payment, Kuntz anticipated that the school's enrollment of full time equivalent students would reach 200 today.

Registration closes at 5:00 p.m. Sept. 22 and many more students are expected to be signed up by that time. While figures are not available for this date in the enrollment period from last year, the present FTE figure is above the total for last year.

Meanwhile, Professor Robert P. Sturm, vice president, was in Winnemucca today signing up 30 students there and expects to sign up 30 in Caliente later this week. Classes under the direction of the school are being started in various communities, as detailed in another story in this issue.

Student activities will be discussed for the first time this year when ECC welcomes its students at an orientation assembly Friday, in the college gym, at 10:00 a.m.

Kuntz is scheduled to open the meeting with a brief explanation of the community college philosophy, curriculum, and extra-curricular activities.

Election procedure for student body officers will be outlined by Activities Director Russell Lundgren. Under his direction students are going to be given an opportunity to revise and amend the one-year-old constitution which must be put in final draft form for board of regents approval.

Members of the student body will be asked to join the yearbook staff. A student publication, the hardbound volume will need to be organized within the next two weeks.

Cowboys has been adopted as a name, and silver and purple will be the college's colors.

Elko College Basketball Schedule for 71-72 Listed

Bob McCausland, basketball coach at Elko Community College, was in attendance at the recent National Junior College Athletic Association Region I annual meeting held in Las Vegas.

McCausland pointed out that all aspects of junior college athletics in Region I, which includes Nevada, California, Utah, Arizona and part of Colorado, were discussed during the two-day meeting.

Among the items on the agenda for the meeting were the setting up of dates for regional meets in all sports, arrangements for the naming of All American and all region players, a service bureau to provide ratings for teams in the region, eligibility of athletes, and rulings on the use of video taping of games and the passing out of the game tapes.

Also discussed were grants-in-aid. McCausland said that because of the cost involved in college athletics, recommendations limiting the

size of travelling teams, players on non-resident scholarships, and the total and types of scholarships were presented.

The group will meet again in September and McCausland noted that if the recommendations are accepted, they will help to level out the disparity between big and little schools. One of the recommendations, he said would give small schools more non-resident scholarships that the larger schools.

McCausland also noted that he finalized the 1971-72 Elko College schedule during the meetings. The schedule will feature 27 games, including the first Elko Community College Invitational Tournament, Jan. 28-29.
